"Automaticity"??? What's that?

Teachers frequently hear parents explain that their children have a very hard time with math. Often, upon taking a closer look, the reason becomes clear: the child never really learned his/her basic math facts very well.

By "well" we mean <u>very quick recall of basic facts</u>. Some call this "automaticity" or "fact fluency." "Automaticity" is seeing the math problem "2+3 = _?_" and knowing - pretty much immediately - that "5" is the answer.

"Automaticity" can also apply to reading. In this case, it is *knowing basic sight words rather than having to stop and sound them out*. Children who have to

stop & sound out basic sight words spend so much of their time and energy on that task that they barely comprehend the real content of what they've just worked so hard to read! It's frustrating & exhausting for these children.

In a few cases, a child may have an actual learning disability. In most cases, however, a child has simply never put in enough consistent time & practice on their sight words or their basic math facts to the point where they are "automatic." It comes easier for some and takes longer for others, but when the basic skills are mastered, learning becomes much more fun.

Daily practice is the key...the same path to success that Steph Curry & LeBron James have taken... practicing their jump shots, free throws, & defense every day, all year long.

Pine children do practice a variety of reading and math skills during the school day. But they need to practice the basics at home every night as well. Not for hours on end, but for about 30 minutes.... every night.... vacations & summers too.

For more specific ideas about reading materials, math

sheets or websites, etc. talk to your child's teacher. Teachers truly enjoy working with parents who take active roles in helping their children succeed.

Make that next report card something to be really proud of! You can do this!

Presidents' Day

(a.k.a. "Famous Americans'"
Day)

So when did Americans first acknowledge our Presidents with their own day?

"Presidents' Day" dates back to our founding father and first
President, George Washington.
Washington was born on February
22, 1732. Though it may seem
strange to us, the official federal
name of this holiday to this day is actually still

"George Washington's Birthday."

Abraham Lincoln was the next President to gain reverence similar to Washington. Born on February 12, 1809, Lincoln's birthday was first celebrated in 1865, the year after he was assassinated. Although his birthday was not honored as a federal holiday like

washington's, many states adopted it as a legal holiday.




In 1968, Congress passed legislation placing several federal holidays on a Monday, including

Washington's birthday, to create a three-day weekend.

In 1971, President Richard Nixon combined the birthdays of George Washington and Abraham Lincoln into the day which most of us refer to as "Presidents'

Day." It would be celebrated on the third Monday in February, regardless of the day on which it fell.

Presidents' Day is now generally viewed as a holiday that pays tribute to both Washington and Lincoln, as well as all those who have served as president.

Interesting Presidential Facts: Presidents #1- #5.

1. George Washington:

- No formal education.
- The only president elected unanimously. He received all 69 electoral votes.

- At his inauguration, Washington had only one tooth. At various times he wore dentures made of human teeth, animal teeth, ivory or even lead. Never wood.
- In addition to the nation's capital and the state, 31 counties and 17 towns are named in his honor.
- He stood 6 feet and 2 inches tall, weighed 200 pounds and wore size 13 shoes.
 - He is the only president who didn't live in Washington, D.C. during his presidency.
 - During his presidency the Judiciary Act of 1789 established the federal court system, the Bank Act of 1791 established a nationwide banking system, the Bill of Rights became law on December 15, 1791.

2. John Adams:

- Graduated Harvard College (1755).
- Adams was the great-great-grandson of John and Priscilla Alden, pilgrims who landed at Plymouth Rock in 1620.
- In 1800 the U.S. capital moved from Philadelphia to Washington, D.C.
- Adams and Jefferson were the only presidents to sign the Declaration of Independence, and they both died on its 50th anniversary, July 4, 1826.
- Adams was vice-President under Washington.
- Older than any other president at his death, he lived 90 years, 247 days.





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3. Thomas Jefferson:

- Graduated College of William and Mary (1762)
- Secretary of State under Washington, Vice-President under Adams.
- Jefferson was the first president to shake hands with guests. Previously people bowed to Presidents.
- Jefferson's library of 6,000 books was purchased for \$23.950 and formed the basis of the Library of Congress.
- Principal author of the Declaration of Independence.
- Jefferson and Adams were the only presidents to sign the Declaration of Independence, and they both died on its 50th anniversary, July 4, 1826.
- He designed his own tombstone and wrote his own epitaph, <u>omitting the</u> <u>fact that he was President of the</u> <u>United States!</u>

4. James Madison:

- Graduated College of New Jersey (now Princeton University; 1771)
- Secretary of State under Jefferson.
- Citing continued attacks on its ships, the United States declared war on Britain in June 1812.
- British troops burned the White House 1814.
- Madison was the first president who had prior service as a congressman, as well as the first president to wear trousers rather than knee breeches.

He stood 5 feet 4 inches, making him the shortest president.

5. James Monroe:

- Graduated College of William and Mary (1776)
- Secretary of State under Madison.
- Secretary of War under Madison.
- Convention of 1818 fixed the boundary between the U.S. and British North America.
- In 1819 purchased Florida from Spain for the cancellation of \$5 million in debts.
- On December 2, 1923 proclaimed the Monroe Doctrine, warning European powers not to interfere in U.S. affairs.
- First president to ride on a steamboat.
- First inaugural to be held outdoors.
- His daughter was the first to be married in the White House.
- The U.S. Marine band played at his second inaugural and every inauguration since.

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


