Students are encouraged to do their very best in all their classes. Remember, the two quarters and semester final all work together to determine a student's final grade for the semester. A student must pass two of these three and show mastery to receive credit for the course. Counselors would like to encourage students to continue to work hard and to seek help when needed. The High School Blitz Academy (run by Safe Harbor) meets Monday – Thursday after school. This is a free program. Registration for the High School Blitz Academy is now online at www.educatemc.net/safeharbor. Students participate in daily academic support and diverse enrichment programs and fun activities. 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From the Treasurer

TEXTBOOK RENTAL FEES

The 2021/2022 Textbook Rental Fees will be loaded in your Power School Account in the near future.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION CONCERNING TEXTBOOK RENTAL ASSISTANCE!

All students at Michigan City Area Schools will receive meals at no charge because of the Community Eligibility Program (CEP)! Students still need funds in their cafeteria account for extra milk or a la carte purchases (*all cafeterias are cashless*). If you need more information visit the food service website at educatemc.net/food.

Because of this program, parents no longer need to apply for meal assistance. However, parents **MUST** still apply for Textbook Rental Assistance.

The Textbook Assistance and Other Educational Benefits application is part of the online registration for all students. If you did not complete the form for this when registering your child, you can complete an application at the Titan Family Portal at family.titank12.com.

Parents must apply for assistance **EACH** school year. Because situations change, families may apply at any time during the year. If you receive Food Stamps or TANF you may already be pre-approved for assistance.

New students to Michigan City Area Schools must complete an application even if they were approved in their old school corporation.

SENIOR PARENTS-IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR PAST DUE FEES

Please watch for information for past due Textbook Rental and Chromebook fees. If you have past due fees you will receive a report of fees due in the mail soon.

CHROMEBOOK INSURANCE AND OTHER CHARGES

We are again offering an optional insurance program for Chromebooks. We **highly recommend that all families purchase this insurance as soon as possible!**

The insurance plan is \$30 for each device and is good for **ONE** year. It will cover two (2) accidental repairs that require part replacement throughout the school year. Equipment that is misused, abused, vandalized or repeatedly damaged through carelessness or neglect will **NOT** be covered by this plan and the full cost of parts will be charged to the student/parent/guardian.

Please note: Insurance does not cover lost or stolen equipment.

If you decline to purchase the insurance, your family is responsible for all costs involved with the repair or replacement of the device. When a repair or service is performed and the device is not insured, you will be invoiced. If the invoice is not paid by due date, you will be turned over to a collection agency and a \$30 fee plus court costs will be added to your balance.

The replacement/repair costs of the Chromebooks/Tablets are as follows:

Entire Chromebook/Tablet - \$180

LCD screen repair/replacement - \$80

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Keyboard repair - \$45

AUTOMOBILE REGULATIONS

The use of motor vehicles for travel to and from school by students is an assumption of responsibility on the part of those students. It is a responsibility in the care of property, the observation of safety rules, and the display of courtesy and consideration toward others. Therefore, students are expected to abide by the following rules, and drive safely and defensively when approaching and exiting the school.

- All students interested in possessing a parking permit at MCHS must be in good standing (not on social probation and GPA of 1.5 or above).
- All vehicles must be registered annually with the school and **display a parking permit**.
- Parking permits may be purchased from the Treasurer's Office. The \$20 fee is non-refundable.
- Parking is strictly limited to each student's designated parking spot.
- The school is not responsible for a vehicle or its contents.
- Students are not to go to their vehicles or to the parking lot at any time during the day without permission from an administrator. Students are asked to exit their vehicles once they arrive and not remain sitting in them.
- Speeding or any form of reckless driving to or from school or on school grounds is prohibited. Drive slowly!
- Student vehicles may be subject to search if there are reasonable grounds to believe that drugs, alcohol, stolen property, or other contraband might be present in that vehicle.
- All cars should be kept locked during school hours.
- Students parked illegally will be subject to disciplinary action and the car may be towed.
- Non-handicapped students are never to park in designated handicapped areas.

Please note: By bringing a vehicle onto school property, it is implied that the student consents to a search of the vehicle and its

contents by a school administrator with a reasonable suspicion that the search will produce evidence of a violation of law, a school rule, or a condition that endangers the safety or health of the student driver or others. The student shall have no expectation of privacy in any vehicle or in the contents of any vehicle operated or parked on school property.

Students who do not abide by MCHS automobile regulations face possible sanctions under the Code of Responsible Behavior, as well as the following: warning ticket, ticket with fine, suspension of driving privileges, and towing of the vehicle.

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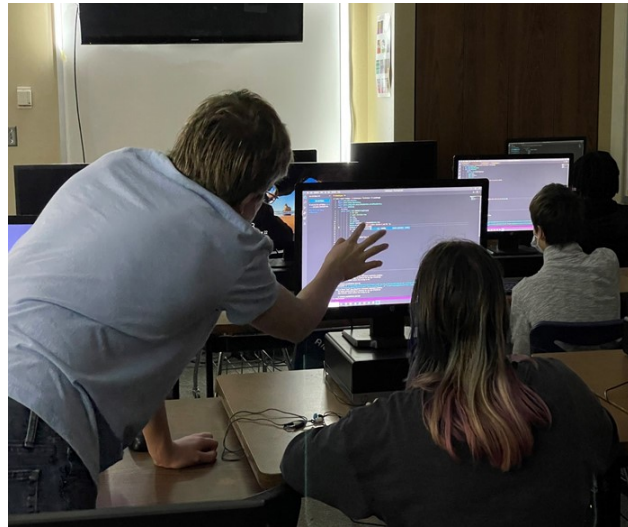

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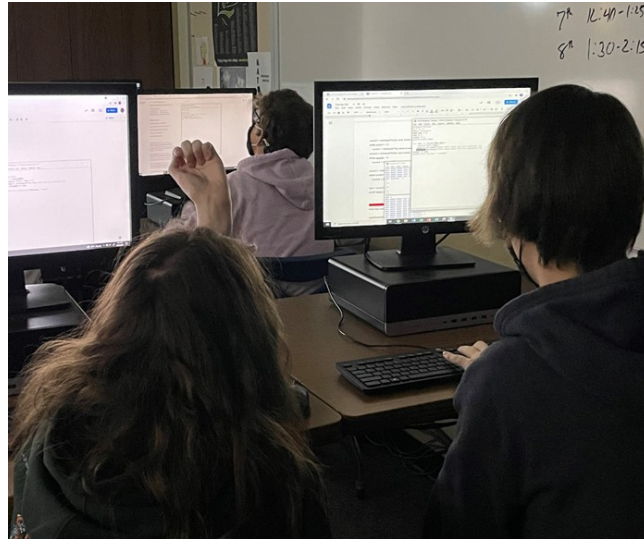
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Introduction to Computer Science

BUSINESS EDUCATION

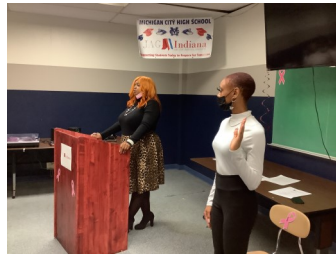

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Math Department News

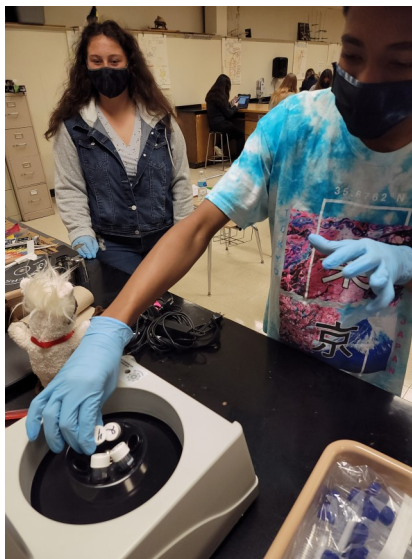
The Math Department is working on piloting a new curriculum this school year in some of our core classes. Core classes that students take to meet Indiana's requirement of 6 Math credits include Algebra I, Algebra II, and Geometry. The new curriculum we are piloting is Illustrative Mathematics.

In addition to the 3 Core Math classes students need to take for graduation, the Math department also offers Dual Credit Math Courses. Students taking course for Dual Credit have the opportunity to receive College Credit upon successful completion of the course. Courses offered for Dual Credit at MCHS are PreCalculus: Algebra, PreCalculus: Trigonometry, Finite Math, Quantitative Reasoning, AP Statistics, and AP Calculus.

In Mr. Layman's Quantitative Reasoning courses, students have been learning how to calculate interest and payments for credit cards, loans, and mortgages. Students have also been learning about applications of ratios and proportions. This includes calculating grades using weighted averages and calculating GPA using weighted grades. We have also been applying the math skills learned to creating spreadsheets based on real-world situations. Students that are successful in the Quantitative Reasoning course will earn dual credit for Math 123 through Ivy Tech.

If students have any questions about any of the math courses offered here at MCHS, please see your math teacher or see Mr. Layman, Math Department Chair.

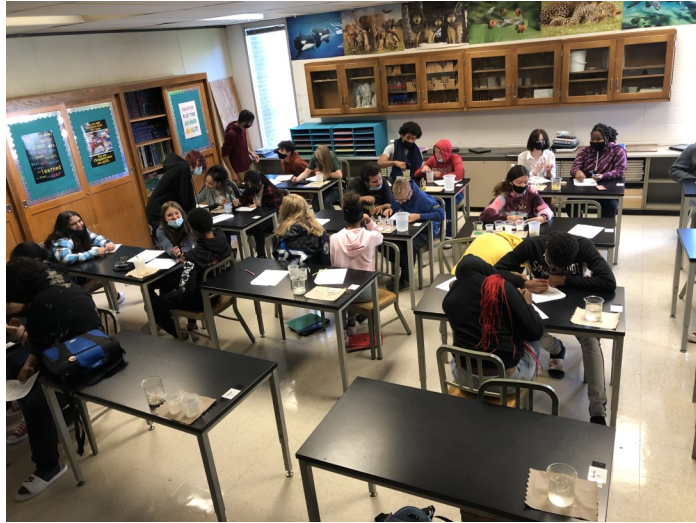

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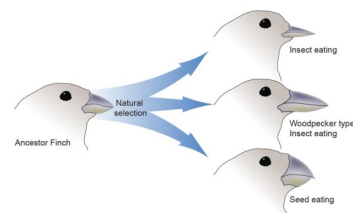
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Ms. Pauer's Biology class determines some properties of water.

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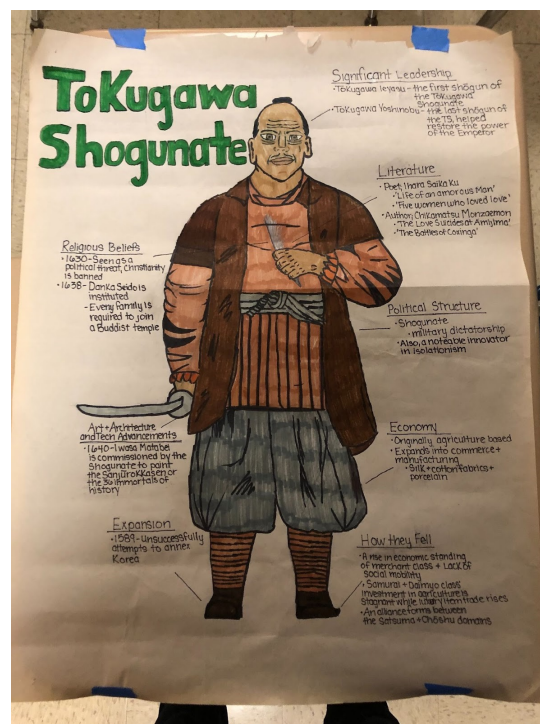
AP World History - Ms. Stolarz

Therefore, every year in October my AP World students complete a poster project, along with an "autopsy," on major land empires that rose in the 13th and 14th centuries and last for varying amounts of time.

On the poster, the students have designated body parts explaining the workings of that empire (i.e. head = leaders, heart = religious beliefs, hand = art, architecture, and technological innovations, etc.).

Following their poster, students had to fill out an official autopsy report declaring exactly how their empire "died," using specific evidence while coming to an ultimate conclusion on how they fell: was the cause of "death" a revolution, or were they conquered, or dismembered, etc.

The students had a blast and some of these works are just amazing! I truly value the place student art holds in varying subject matters, especially when teaching history.

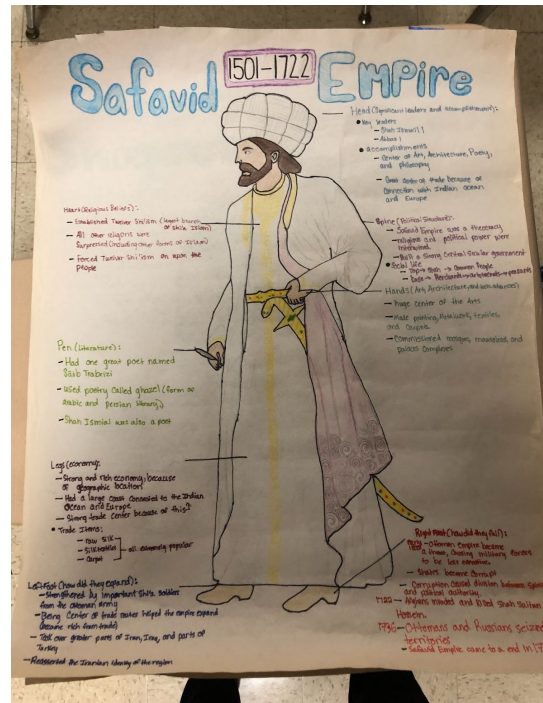


Tokugawa Shogunate by Bailey Chavis

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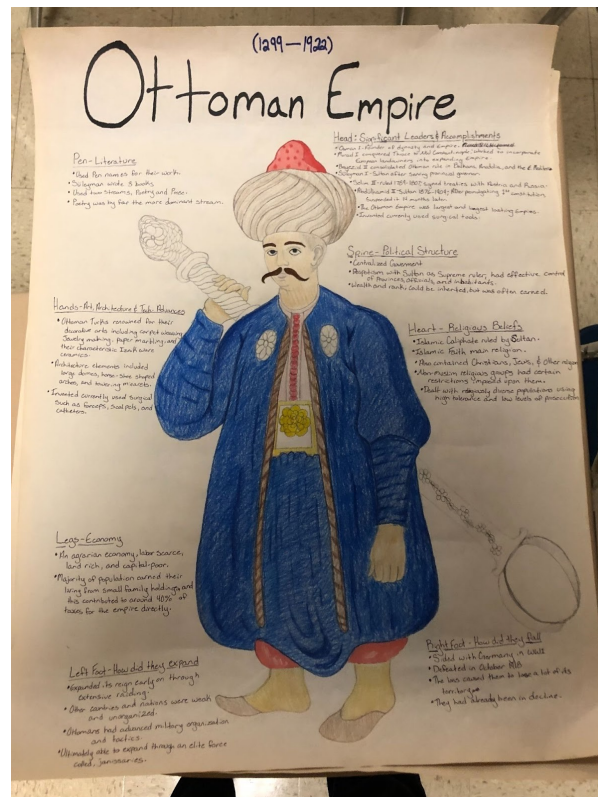
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Ottoman Empire by Ashley McKinney

JROTC

MCHS MCJROTC PARTICIPATE IN NATIONAL CYBER SECURITY COMPETITION



Cyber Security is a career field that offers great opportunities for advancement and pays very well. Cadets of the Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) are being introduced to the required skills necessary for that career by participating in Cyber Patriot, the national cyber security competition. Cadets act as managers for a company's information system. They are given a set of virtual operating systems and must find and fix vulnerabilities while maintaining critical services. The top teams earn an all-expense paid trip to Maryland for the Finals competition where they can earn national recognition and scholarship money.

"The cybersecurity field is such a great opportunity for young people today," said Mr. Ralph Gee, Head of the Technology and Engineering Department at MCHS, who also advises the CyberPatriot team. "Cyber Patriot is an excellent venue to expose MCHS students to the challenges a cyber security manager faces and how

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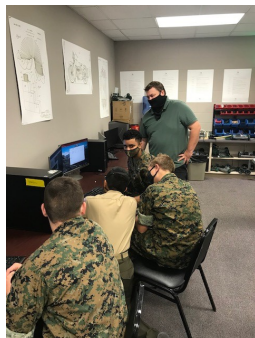
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to meet those challenges, leading to a very fulfilling and lucrative career."

Major Tom McGrath, the Senior Marine Instructor, noted the cadets dedication. "The cadets on our CyberPatriot team are also on our Military Drill Team. They are at school at 5:45 am to practice drill, are high performers in all of their classes (all members of the team have over a B average) and then practice Cyber Patriot after school."



McGrath's comments were echoed by Marine Instructor Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, who noted the "total cadet concept" of the team members. "We encourage our cadets to get involved with extracurriculars outside of the JROTC. There is a football player, a cross country runner, and the president of the National Honor Society on the team."

The cadets will compete in November and December, which will decide if they advance to further rounds.

MCHS MCJROTC CADETS SUPPORT MCAS, COMMUNITY



The cadets of the Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) continued to support Michigan City Area Schools (MCAS) and community activities. 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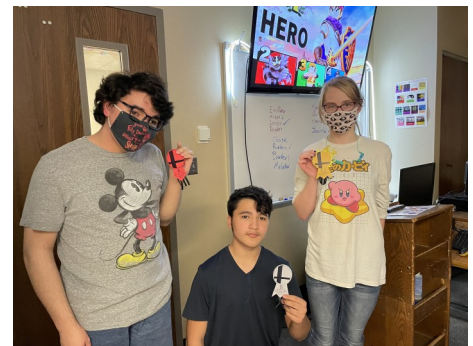
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Anime Club

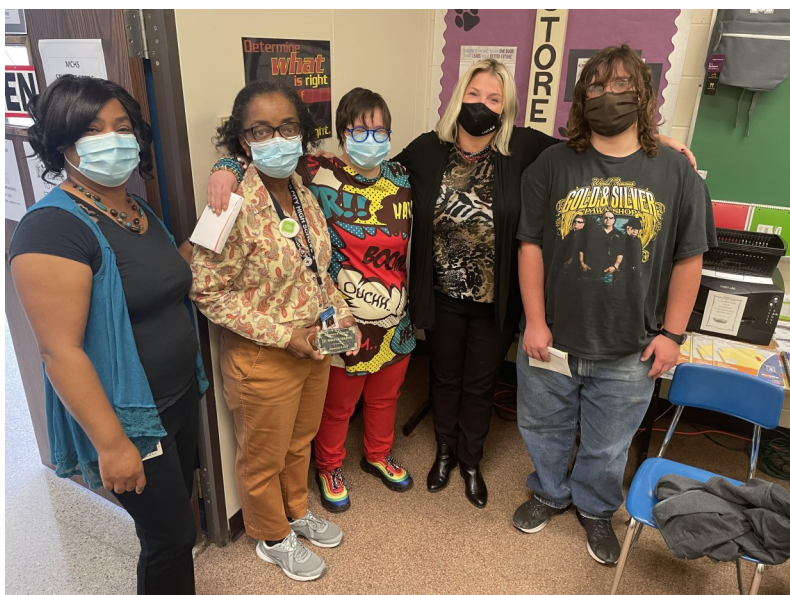


Student Store
