From the Desk of the Co-Principals...

Greetings Michigan City High School Families,

It is truly the most wonderful time of the year. It is hard to believe 2021 is almost over. The school year continues to move at a rapid pace as we are entering the month of December. We only have a few weeks before we go on Winter Break from December 20th–December 31st. Students will resume classes on January 3rd. The first semester ends on January 14, 2021. The second semester will begin on January 18th, as there is no school on Monday, January 17th for Martin Luther King Jr. Day.

As we close out the first semester, please pay special attention to your student's grades and credits. All students must accumulate as many credits as possible each semester. Remember if your student fails a class, no credit is awarded. Students must accumulate 44 credits in specific content areas to graduate, as well as fulfill additional requirements. - 1. ISTEP retests for seniors will be on November 30th (Math) and and December 1st (English).
- 2. The SAT will be held at MCHS on December 4th. Remember to bring your photo ID and printed admission ticket, or you will not be permitted to test.
- 3. The ACT will be held at MCHS on December 11th. Remember to bring your photo ID and printed admission ticket, or you will not be permitted to test.

Seniors: Remember to submit transcript requests through your Naviance account. Mr. Garrett sent numerous emails on how to do this, along with scholarships and other opportunities. He also provides a list of scholarships on Naviance under "Scholarships and Money." We urge students to frequently check their school email account for important messages.

Your counseling team would like to encourage all students to check their Powerschool accounts frequently to monitor their grades and progress.

Winter break will begin on December 20th. We hope you will take time to rest, rejuvenate and study for finals!

TEXTBOOK RENTAL FEES

The 2021/2022 Textbook Rental Fee Statements have been sent home via mail and email, if we have a current email on file for the guardian. The statements are for the **school year**, not by semester. You may make payments throughout the year with check, cash, or money orders. Online payments are not available this year. We would like all fees to be paid by the end of the school year. Contact the treasurer if you have any questions.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION CONCERNING TEXTBOOK RENTAL ASSISTANCE!

All students at Michigan City Area Schools will receive meals at no charge because of the Community Eligibility Program (CEP)! Students still need funds in their cafeteria account for extra milk or a la carte purchases (all cafeterias are cashless). If you need more information visit the food service website at educatemc.net/food. Because of this program, parents no longer need to apply for meal assistance. However, parents MUST still apply for Textbook Rental Assistance.

The Textbook Assistance and Other Educational Benefits application is part of the online registration for all students. If you did not complete the form for this when registering your child, you can complete an application at the Titan Family Portal at family.titank12.com.

Parents must apply for assistance **EACH** school year. Because situations change, families may apply at any time during the year. If you receive Food Stamps or TANF you may already be preapproved for assistance.

New students to Michigan City Area Schools must complete an application even if they were approved in their old school corporation.

SENIOR PARENTS-IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR PAST DUE FEES

Please watch for information for past due Textbook Rental and Chromebook fees. If you have past due fees you will receive a report of fees due in the mail soon.

CHROMEBOOK INSURANCE AND OTHER CHARGES

We are again offering an optional insurance program for Chromebooks. We **highly recommend that all families purchase this insurance as soon as possible!**

The insurance plan is \$30 for each device and is good for **ONE** year. It will cover two (2) accidental repairs that require part replacement throughout the school year. Equipment that is misused, abused, vandalized or repeatedly damaged through carelessness or neglect will NOT be covered by this plan and the full cost of parts will be charged to the student/parent/guardian.

Please note: Insurance does not cover lost or stolen equipment.

If you decline to purchase the insurance, your family is responsible for all costs involved with the repair or replacement of the device. When a repair or service is performed and the device is not insured, you will be invoiced. If the invoice is not paid by due date, you will be turned over to a collection agency and a \$30 fee plus court costs will be added to your balance.

The replacement/repair costs of the Chromebooks/Tablets are as follows:

Entire Chromebook/Tablet - \$180 LCD screen repair/replacement - \$80

AUTOMOBILE REGULATIONS

The use of motor vehicles for travel to and from school by students is an assumption of responsibility on the part of those students. It is a responsibility in the care of property, the observation of safety rules, and the display of courtesy and consideration toward others. Therefore, students are expected to abide by the following rules, and drive safely and defensively when approaching and exiting the school.

- All students interested in possessing a parking permit at MCHS must be in good standing (not on social probation and GPA of 1.5 or above).
- All vehicles must be registered annually with the school and **display a parking permit**.
- Parking permits may be purchased from the Treasurer's Office. The \$20 fee is non-refundable.
- Parking is strictly limited to each student's designated parking spot.
- The school is not responsible for a vehicle or its contents.
- Students are not to go to their vehicles or to the parking lot at any time during the day without permission from an administrator. Students are asked to exit their vehicles once they arrive and not remain sitting in them.
- Speeding or any form of reckless driving to or from school or on school grounds is prohibited. Drive slowly!
- Student vehicles may be subject to search if there are reasonable grounds to believe that drugs, alcohol, stolen property, or other contraband might be present in that vehicle.
- All cars should be kept locked during school hours.
- Students parked illegally will be subject to disciplinary action and the car may be towed.
- Non-handicapped students are never to park in designated handicapped areas.

Please note: By bringing a vehicle onto school property, it is implied that the student consents to a search of the vehicle and its

contents by a school administrator with a reasonable suspicion that the search will produce evidence of a violation of law, a school rule, or a condition that endangers the safety or health of the student driver or others. The student shall have no expectation of privacy in any vehicle or in the contents of any vehicle operated or parked on school property.

Students who do not abide by MCHS automobile regulations face possible sanctions under the Code of Responsible Behavior, as well as the following: warning ticket, ticket with fine, suspension of driving privileges, and towing of the vehicle.



MCHS HONORS VETERANS

Michigan City High School (MCHS) conducted a ceremony honoring veterans on November 10th in the high school gym. It was done the day before Veterans Day because November 11th was a scheduled E Learning Day for the school. The ceremony was a modified military parade, featuring the MCHS band, choir and Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCROTC). The quest speaker was Northwest Indiana's US Congressman Frank Mrvan. Congressman Mrvan recognized the sacrifices of veterans, of how they put "service over self." He also noted the performance of the band, choir and MCJROTC students as an example of the outstanding young men and women being educated at MCHS. Among the highlights of the event was the band playing the Armed Forces Medley, where veterans of their respective services were recognized when their service song was played. Another highlight was the choir singing the National Anthem and other patriotic songs. After echo taps, where those who died in the service of our country were remembered, the MCJROTC cadets marched in "pass and review" to conclude the ceremony.

The students who conducted the ceremony have no time to rest until the holiday break. The band and choir will be preparing for and performing in the One City One Sound holiday concert. Unfortunately, due to Covid concerns, the concert will be virtual. The MCJROTC cadets will host a military drill competition on Dec 4th at MCHS. JROTC schools from Illinois and Indiana will compete, with the judges being midshipmen from the University of Notre Dame. Admission is free and is open to the public. The cadets will then compete the following Saturday at Portage High School.




MCHS MCJROTC SUPPORTS THE SALVATION ARMY

While most Michigan City High School (MCHS) students were sleeping off the tough semi-state playoff football loss to Zionsville and starting their Thanksgiving break, the cadets of the MCHS Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) were up early on Saturday morning, November 20th, to assist Michigan City chapter of the Marine Corps League with the Salvation Army's bell-ringing campaign. "Our cadets realize how many people the Salvation Army helps throughout LaPorte County, to include many MCHS students," said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath. "These are the same cadets who are at the school daily at 5:45 am for military drill team practice. They also worked the football playoff game the previous night. They are truly unselfish kids."

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, said that this dedication to the school and community was typical of the cadets. "I am impressed with the work ethic that our cadets show in the classroom, on the drill deck, and supporting our community."

MCHS will be hosting a military drill meet on December 4th in the school gym. It is free and open to the public, Schools from throughout Indiana and Illinois will compete, with the judges coming from the University of Notre Dame ROTC. This meet is a precursor to the MJROTC Regional competition to be held at Purdue University in West Lafayette. The winner of that meet will be fully funded by the Marine Corps to compete in the National Championship meet in Daytona Beach, FL. This, like all MCJROTC activities, are done at no cost to the student.


