## Message from our Principals

Interested students should contact their counselor to get signed up immediately.

We hope you will continue to check PowerSchool, communicate with counselors and teachers, and do what is needed to insure your student graduates College and Career Ready! ## From the Nurse - Dawn Forney

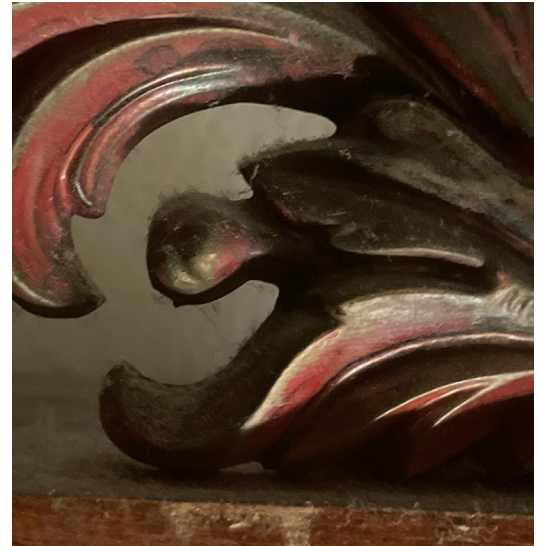

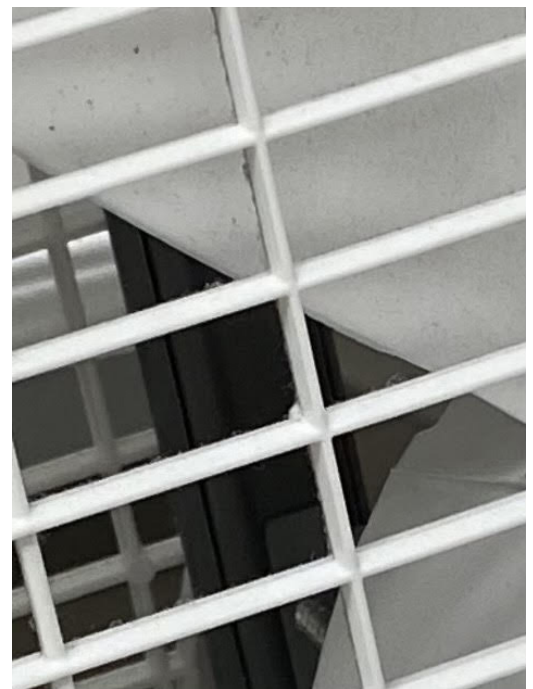

# Business Department

## Why taking Business Courses in High School is Important

First semester is rapidly coming to an end and scheduling your classes for next year is on the horizon. Regardless of what your future holds you will need business knowledge and skills. Our business courses at Michigan City High School enable you to:

- Develop your leadership and problem-solving skills by solving real problems that don't have answers that can be found in a textbook.
- Use industry standard software: Microsoft, Quick Books and Adobe.
- Many concepts and skills in business are applicable to general life and may be useful.
- Find a new interest. Learning about business may spark the "inner entrepreneur".

Let's take a look at some of the courses and what we offer you.

### ENTREPRENEURSHIP

Entrepreneurship courses take students' introductory business knowledge to the next level. The courses teach students how to collaborate and work with a team, prepare an effective presentation, as well as collect and analyze data. Students learn to understand the product development cycle, develop unique business proposals, and deliver pitch presentations - just like real business owners.

### PERSONAL FINANCE.

Achieving financial literacy is crucial for high-school students, whether or not they plan to venture into the world of business after they graduate. Personal finance courses teach students how to navigate the financial services industry and begin the financial planning process.

Students learn strategies for saving and investing, making major purchasing decisions, and protecting themselves against risk and financial loss. Everyone needs these skills

### DIGITAL APPLICATIONS

The focus of this course is to provide knowl-

edge and skills associated with Microsoft Office applications including: Word, PowerPoint, Excel, Access, and Publisher. Students will create various documents: reports, business letters, tables, databases, spreadsheets, and brochures. In addition, students will expand their knowledge of computer terminology, parts of a computer, and search strategies on the Internet.

### ACCOUNTING

Accounting is the language of business. After completing this course, you will have a major advantage when taking college accounting and possess the skills necessary for entry-level accounting and bookkeeping careers. During the course of the semester you will: prepare financial records, develop financial reports, enhance your general knowledge of business, and learn payroll and taxes. Not majoring in business, you will learn personal applications in Accounting, such as: budgeting, investing, taxes, and banking. All students will learn Quick Books and put your knowledge to work as your complete an accounting simulation.

### COMPUTER SCIENCE.

It's impossible to imagine a world without computers — which means basic computer science is a vital skill for any student. Understanding the basics of web development and newer technologies is essential for keeping up with a rapidly changing world. However, diving even deeper into computer science can give high-school students a huge competitive advantage long after graduation. For example, here at Michigan City High School, students have the opportunity to dive deep into object-oriented programming with Java and learn industry-standard techniques for testing and debugging or take a class in Cybersecurity.

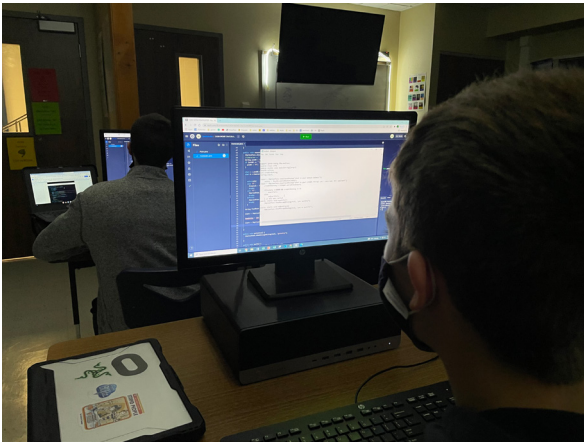

# Computer Science 1

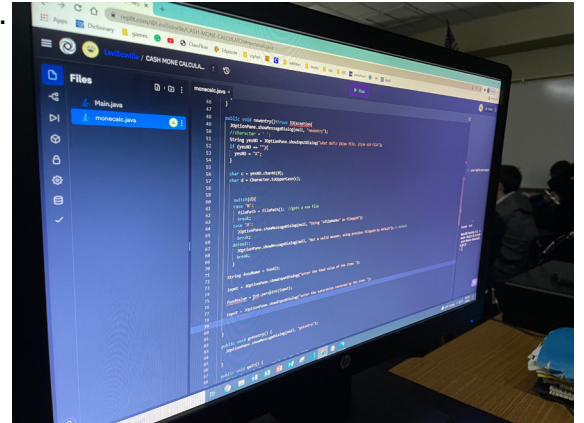
Students have been diligently working on their final projects. Students had the option of creating a text based game, banking software, school management software or a transportation scheduler.

# Introduction to Computer Science

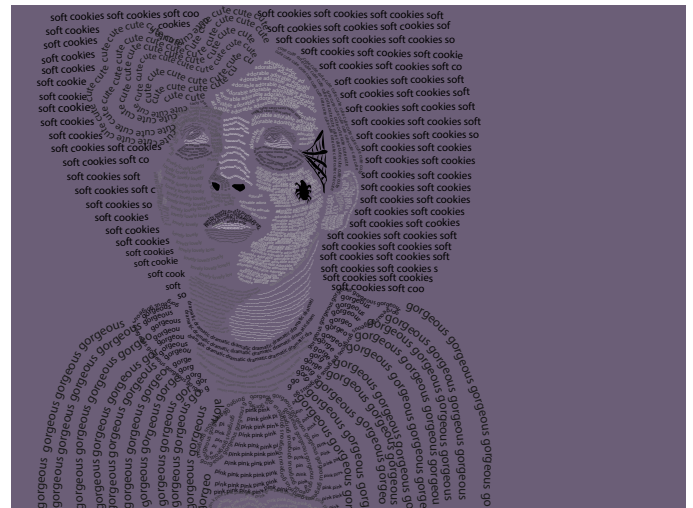

## Computer Illustration & Graphics

Students have been working on doing a self-reflection piece where they take an image of themselves and outline their face with contour lines. On those lines then they write words that they think about themselves. Once this step was completed they asked others when they look at them what do they see. Then they exchanged their words for what others see. In all they created two different pieces.

Next semester we will start learning Adobe Animate. This is a vector based program that will teach the students how to draw on the computer as well as animate frame by frame and tween animations.

### Final Exam Preparation

What is the best way to prepare for final exams? There are several ways. Attending class is the best way to get all of the material that you

need to study for the tests. Class time is the most convenient time to ask questions about topics that you did not understand during the semester. Reviewing old assignments is another way of preparing for final exams. The key to doing well is to prepare in advance. Preparation cuts down on nervousness and eliminates test anxiety.

### Stress Reduction

## Early College Alumni Day

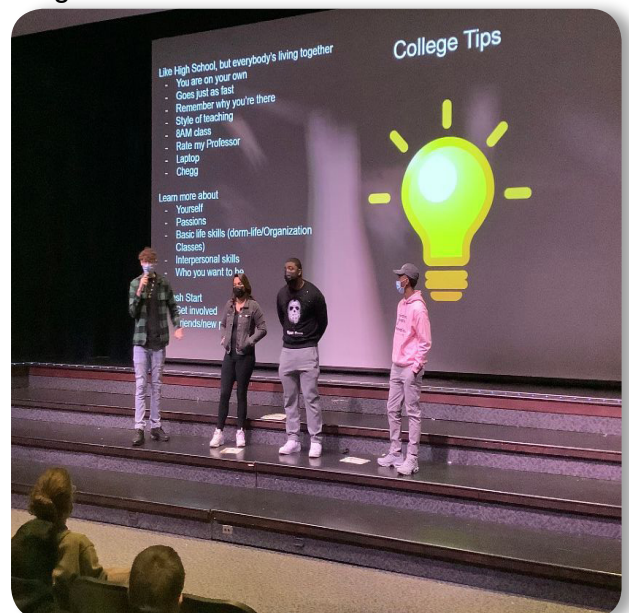
Another exciting first for the Early College this

## MCHS MCJROTC SUPPORTS SCHOOL OVER HOLIDAY BREAK

The cadets of the Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) supported MCHS by providing



the Color Guard for the basketball game against Penn and helping set up and then tear down for the MCHS wrestling tournament on December 23rd. The military drill team was also practicing for their competition at Portage on February 26th. This meet is a precursor to the MCJROTC Regional Championship meet on March 12th at

Purdue University in West Lafayette. The winner of that meet will compete in the MCJROTC championship in Orlando, Florida in April. The cost of that trip, like all MCJROTC activities, are done at no cost to the student. All expenses are covered by the Marine Corps.



maintain the program. "The Marine Corps recognizes the challenges that Covid has brought to the JROTC," said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath.

The cadets will be conducting presentations at each MCHS middle school on January 19th. The program was not able to do the presentations last year due to Covid. That, like many other Covid-related factors, had a detrimental effect on enrollment. The Marine Corps requires that a school have an enrollment of at least 100 cadets to

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, stressed the quality of the cadets as a program strength. "We have some really great kids who make up for our enrollment being less than 100. A great example of that is that we will be able to support MCHS hosting the boys Regional Basketball tournament and compete in the MCJROTC Regional Drill Championship at Purdue on the same day."

In addition to their teaching and extracurricular coaching duties, both instructors are busy planning for MCHS's week-long summer Leadership Camp at the St. John's Northwestern Military Academy in Delafield, WI. They feel that the camp, a challenging and motivating event for the cadets, will assist in raising enrollment.

## MJROTC Cyber Patriot

Cadets of the Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) participated in the third round of Cyber Patriot, the nation's cybersecurity competition for high school students. Students act as Information Technology Managers of an organization who have to defend against and counterattack a cyber attack. This was the state qualifying round to determine who would be eligible to compete for the final tournament which is held in Baltimore, Maryland. For MCJROTC schools who qualify, the Marine Corps will fund the entire cost of that trip. MCHS's preliminary score was the highest they have earned in the 10 years in which they have competed. All scores will be confirmed by the competition's sponsor, the Air Force Association, in a week.

"In a world where everyone's competitiveness is dependent on technological knowledge, this is an exceptionally beneficial extra-curricular activity for students," said Mr. Ralph Gee, the Technology and Engineering instructor at MCHS who is the faculty advisor for the competition.

Major Tom McGrath, the Senior Marine Instructor, commented on the cadets ability to multitask. "The cadets participating in this highly technological activity are the same cadets who competed in our military drill meet last week.

They are very adaptable, being able to transition from the instantaneous obedience to orders of military drill to the numerous variables of a cyber attack."

"After doing this mentally draining activity on Friday, these cadets will arise early the next day to work the Salvation Army food drive. These are truly individuals who go above and beyond for our school and community," said Marine Instructor Master Sergeant Jeff Benak.

The cadets will be practicing over the holiday break to prepare for their next drill competition and for their presentation to the 8th graders of Barker and Kreuger Middle Schools prior to those students scheduling for their freshmen courses at the high school. The Marine

Corps requires that schools have an enrollment of at least 100 cadets in order to maintain the program.

## MJROTC Drill Meet

Michigan City High School (MCHS) hosted and competed in a military drill meet held at the high school on Saturday, December 4th. Schools

from throughout Indiana and Illinois attended the meet. It was sponsored by the Michigan City chapter of the Marine Corps League and the MCHS Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer

Training Corps (MCJROTC) Booster Club. Judges were provided by the University of Notre Dame Navy/Marine Corps ROTC. Portage edged out Indianapolis Ben Davis and Romeoville, Illinois to win the meet.

"Hosting a drill meet is much work," said MCHS Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath. "Since it requires more time added to MCJROTC teaching and extra-curricular coaching requirements, most schools don't do it, to include schools that have superior facilities to ours. Despite the many challenges this year has brought-gym renovations, Covid concerns, and outside activities beyond our control, our cadets still wanted to

host the meet. This shows the competitiveness of MCHS students."

Despite the challenges mentioned by McGrath that also hindered MCHS's preparation to compete in the meet, MCHS still took third place in Color Guard and the Personnel Inspection. Cadet First Lieutenant Darrick Hammond earned seventh place out of 100 cadets in individual competition. Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, praised the cadets for rising to the occasion. "They have really worked hard in practice, particularly the first year cadets who had to com-

pete at the varsity level. To be able to stay with these larger schools who have more practice options than us due to better facilities, really speaks highly of MCHS cadets.”

Although not earning a trophy, Cadet Major Declan Rice, who commanded the Unarmed Regulation Platoon, was gratified by the experience. “Commanding a drill unit is probably the hardest thing that I have ever done. We have great cadets who competed well today and represented Michigan City High School in the best possible light to the many schools and spectators who came here.”

MCHS’ next meet will be February 26th at Portage. The MCJROTC Regional Championship is scheduled for Purdue University, probably in March. The winner of that meet will then go to Daytona Beach, Florida, for the National Championship. All costs for that trip will be funded by the Marine Corps.

## TEXTBOOK RENTAL FEES

The 2021/2022 Textbook Rental Fee Statements have been sent home via mail and email, if we have a current email on file for the guardian. The statements are for the school year, not by semester. You may make payments throughout the year with check, cash, or money orders. Online payments are not available this year. We would like all fees to be paid by the end of the school year. Contact the treasurer if you have any questions.

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION CONCERNING TEXTBOOK RENTAL ASSISTANCE!

All students at Michigan City Area Schools will receive meals at no charge because of the Community Eligibility Program (CEP)! Students still need funds in their cafeteria account for extra milk or a la carte purchases (all cafeterias are cashless). If you need more information visit the food service website at [educatemc.net/food](http://educatemc.net/food). Because of this program, parents no longer need to apply for meal assistance. However, parents MUST still apply for Textbook Rental Assistance.

The Textbook Assistance and Other Educational Benefits application is part of the online registration for all students. If you did not complete the form for this when registering your child, you can complete an application at the Titan Family Portal at [family.titank12.com](http://family.titank12.com).

Parents must apply for assistance EACH school year. Because situations change, families may apply at any time during the year. If you receive Food Stamps or TANF you may already be pre-approved for assistance. New students to Michigan City Area Schools must complete an application even if they were approved in their old school corporation.

## SENIOR PARENTS-IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR PAST DUE FEES

Please watch for information for past due Textbook Rental and Chromebook fees. If you have past due fees you will receive a report of fees due in the mail soon.

## CHROMEBOOK INSURANCE AND OTHER CHARGES

We are again offering an optional insurance program for Chromebooks. We highly recommend that all families purchase this insurance as soon as possible! The insurance plan is \$30 for each device and is good for ONE year. It will cover two (2) accidental repairs

that require part replacement throughout the school year. Equipment that is misused, abused, vandalized or repeatedly damaged through carelessness or neglect will NOT be covered by this plan and the full cost of parts will be charged to the student/parent/guardian.

Please note: Insurance does not cover lost or stolen equipment.

If you decline to purchase the insurance, your family is responsible for all costs involved with the repair or replacement of the device. When a repair or service is performed and the device is not insured, you will be invoiced. If the invoice is not paid by due date, you will be turned over to a collection agency and a \$30 fee plus court costs will be added to your balance.

The replacement/repair costs of the Chromebooks/ Tablets are as follows:

- Entire Chromebook/Tablet - \$180
- LCD screen repair/replacement - \$80
- Keyboard repair - \$45

## PARKING PERMIT INFORMATION

**Many students have completed their application but have not paid the fee and obtained their parking permit. Please see the treasurer ASAP to complete the process.**

Students need to complete the application using the link below and upload their driver's license and registration. After submitting the application they can pay for the permit at the treasurer's office. They will receive a receipt and their permit for their designated parking spot. [Permit Application](#)

The use of motor vehicles for travel to and from school by students is an assumption of responsibility on the part of those students. It is a responsibility in the care of property, the observation of safety rules, and the display of courtesy and consideration toward others. Therefore, students are expected to abide by the following rules, and drive safely and defensively when approaching and exiting the school.

- All students interested in possessing a parking permit at MCHS must be in good standing (not on social probation and GPA of 1.5 or above).
- All vehicles must be registered annually with the school and display a parking permit.
- Parking permits may be purchased from the Treasurer's Office. The \$20 fee is non-refundable.
- Parking is strictly limited to each student's designated parking spot.

# Treasurer Tidings

- The school is not responsible for a vehicle or its contents.
- Students are not to go to their vehicles or to the parking lot at any time during the day without permission from an administrator. Students are asked to exit their vehicles once they arrive and not remain sitting in them.
- Speeding or any form of reckless driving to or from school or on school grounds is prohibited. Drive slowly!
- Student vehicles may be subject to search if there are reasonable grounds to believe that drugs, alcohol, stolen property, or other contraband might be present in that vehicle.
- All cars should be kept locked during school hours.
- Students parked illegally will be subject to disciplinary action and the car may be towed.
- Non-handicapped students are never to park in designated handicapped areas.

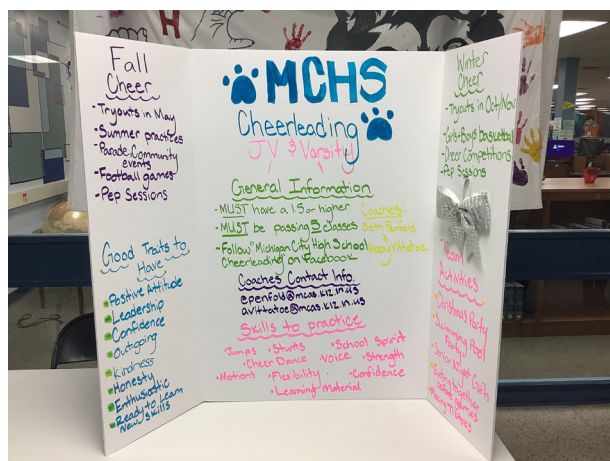
Please note: By bringing a vehicle onto school property, it is implied that the student consents to a search of the vehicle and its

contents by a school administrator with a reasonable suspicion that the search will produce evidence of a violation of law, a school rule, or a condition that endangers the safety or health of the student driver or others. The student shall have no expectation of privacy in any vehicle or in the contents of any vehicle operated or parked on school property.

Students who do not abide by MCHS automobile regulations face possible sanctions under the Code of Responsible Behavior, as well as the following: warning ticket, ticket with fine, suspension of driving privileges, and towing of the vehicle.

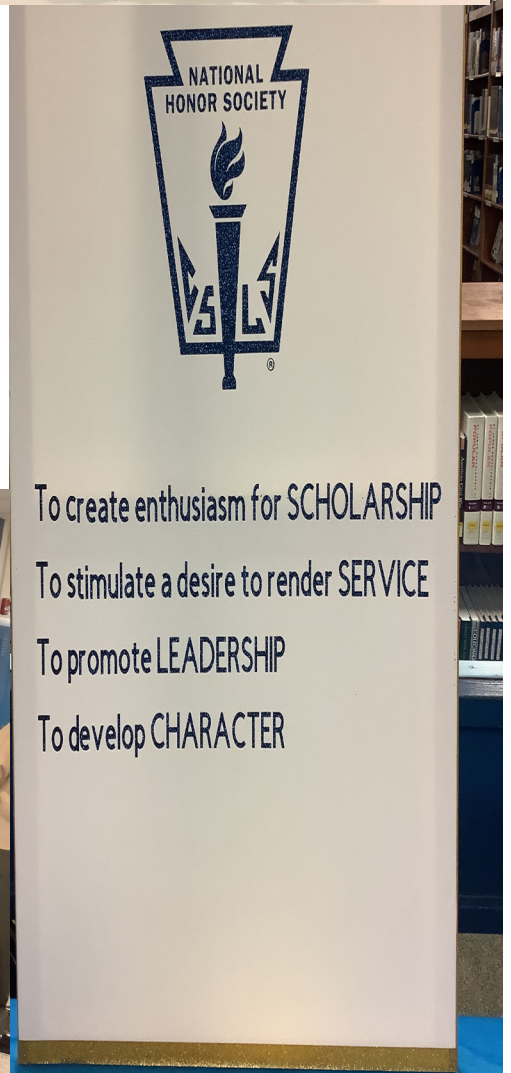
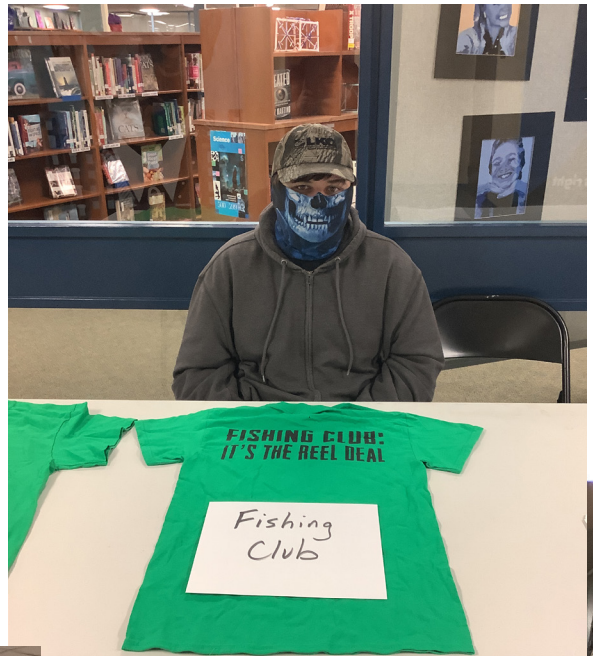
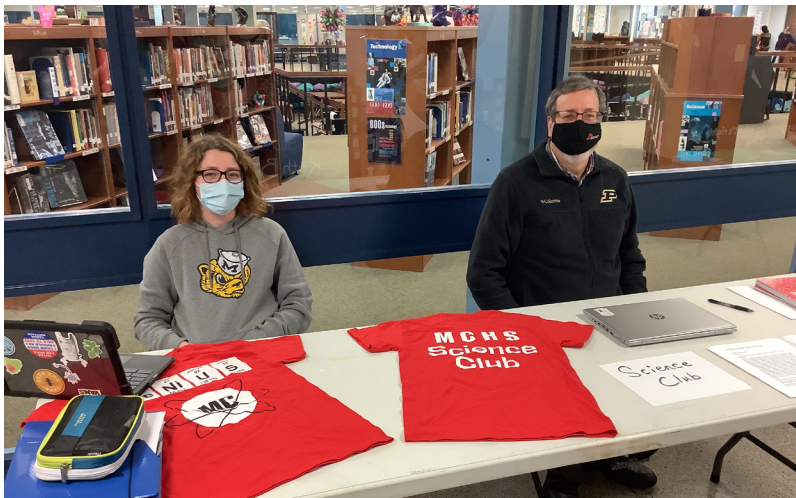
