MCJROTC

The Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps was very busy during March, supporting school and community activities as well as competing in the MCJROTC Regional Drill Championship at Purdue University in West Lafayette on March 5th..

MCHS hosted the Boys Regional Basketball tournament on March 14th. The cadets provided parking support for the semi-final games in the morning and the championship game game at night. They also provided the Color Guard for the morning and evening games. Of note, with a crowd of nearly 7000 for the championship game between Chesterton and Penn, the crowd spontaneously sang the National Anthem. That motivated the public address announcer Stan Hargraves to exclaim "That was awesome!"


"I think that our Color Guard, impeccable in their Dress Blue uniforms, and executing all of the drill movements precisely and crisply, had a lot to do with that reaction from the crowd," said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath.

In between the games, the cadets marched in the Michigan City St. Patrick's parade. The wind chill factor was in the teens the entire day and night. Besides the weather and enthusiastic fans from the four schools who participated in the games, the Scholastic Aptitude Test was given in the morning and there was a play being held at night at MCHS, necessitating the cadets to react quickly and decisively to find and direct cars into parking spaces. "Our cadets showed their physical and mental endurance throughout the day and night supporting our school and community," said Marine Instructor Master Sergeant Jeff Benak.

Other events that the cadets supported were the dance at Barker Middle School on March 11th, the set-up and tear-down of the LaPorte County Garden Club Show on March 18 and 19th, the International Lions Club convention in Laporte on March 19th, and the first home track meet on March 30th. The MCHS MCJROTC will continue to support the track season and other events to the end of the school year. They will also conduct a leadership camp in Wisconsin in June and send cadets to national MCJROTC drill and leadership camps in the summer. All of those camps are done at no cost to the cadet. They are completely funded by the Marine Corps.

The Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) competed in their Sectional Military Drill Championship held at Purdue University in West Lafayette, earning a third place in the Armed Exhibition category. Nine schools participated, with the 13 other schools in the Section choosing not to compete. The other categories in which MCHS competed were the Personnel Inspection, Armed Regulation, Unarmed Regulation, and Color Guard. All of those units were commanded by Cadet Major Declan Rice.

"Cadet Rice has been a superlative performer during his four years at MCHS," said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath. "As most schools have the depth to have a separate commander for each category, our drill team doesn't have that luxury, so Declan really stepped up to take on much increased responsibility."

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, noted the improvement of the team over the season. "We raised our scores at Purdue in every category. It shows how hard our kids are willing to work, even though we are lacking in numbers." The team started with 20 cadets, but finished with 11.

"We say, somewhat tongue-in-cheek, that, if it was easy, anybody could be a MCHS cadet," said McGrath. "But in a way, it is certainly true of the drill team. These kids are here at 5:45 every morning to practice, because it is the only time that the gym is available, as our one gym supports all MCHS sports. Maybe we can get some of that Covid money and MCHS could build a field house,

like most of our competitors have" he said, also half-jokingly.

The cadets will be busy right up to Spring Break, supporting MCHS and the community. They will be working parking and providing the Color Guards for the Boys Regional Basketball Tournament on March 12th. They will also be marching in the Michigan City St. Patrick's Day parade on the same day. Additional events that they will be supporting are the LaPorte County Garden Show and the MCHS Boys and Girls Track Meets.



TEXTBOOK RENTAL FEES

The 2021/2022 Textbook Rental Fee Statements have been sent home via mail and email, if we have a current email on file for the guardian. The statements are for the school year, not by semester. You may make payments throughout the year with check, cash, or money orders. Online payments are not available this year. We would like all fees to be paid by the end of the school year. Contact the treasurer if you have any questions.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION CONCERNING TEXT-BOOK RENTAL ASSISTANCE!

All students at Michigan City Area Schools will receive meals at no charge because of the Community Eligibility Program (CEP)! Students still need funds in their cafeteria account for extra milk or a la carte purchases (all cafeterias are cashless). If you need more information visit the food service website at educatemc.net/food. Because of this program, parents no longer need to apply for meal assistance. However, parents MUST still apply for Textbook Rental Assistance.

The Textbook Assistance and Other Educational Benefits application is part of the online registration for all students. If you did not complete the form for this when registering your child, you can complete an application at the Titan Family Portal at family.titank12.com.

Parents must apply for assistance EACH school year. Because situations change, families may apply at any time during the year. If you receive Food Stamps or TANF you may already be pre-approved for assistance. New students to Michigan City Area Schools must complete an application even if they were approved in their old school corporation.

SENIOR PARENTS-IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR PAST DUE FEES

Please watch for information for past due Textbook Rental and Chromebook fees. If you have past due fees you will receive a report of fees due in the mail soon.

CHROMEBOOK INSURANCE AND OTHER CHARGES

We are again offering an optional insurance program for Chromebooks. We highly recommend that all families purchase this insurance as soon as possible! The insurance plan is \$30 for each device and is good for ONE year. It will cover two (2) accidental repairs

that require part replacement throughout the school year. Equipment that is misused, abused, vandalized or repeatedly damaged through carelessness or neglect will NOT be covered by this plan and the full cost of parts will be charged to the student/parent/guardian.

Please note: Insurance does not cover lost or stolen equipment.

If you decline to purchase the insurance, your family is responsible for all costs involved with the repair or replacement of the device. When a repair or service is performed and the device is not insured, you will be invoiced. If the invoice is not paid by due date, you will be turned over to a collection agency and a \$30 fee plus court costs will be added to your balance.

The replacement/repair costs of the Chromebooks/ Tablets are as follows:

- Entire Chromebook/Tablet \$180
- LCD screen repair/replacement \$80
- Keyboard repair \$45

PARKING PERMIT INFORMATION

Many students have completed their application but have not paid the fee and obtained their parking permit. Please see the treasurer ASAP to complete the process.

Students need to complete the application using the link below and upload their driver's license and registration. After submitting the application they can pay for the permit at the treasurer's office. They will receive a receipt and their permit for their designated parking spot. Permit Application

The use of motor vehicles for travel to and from school by students is an assumption of responsibility on the part of those students. It is a responsibility in the care of property, the observation of safety rules, and the display of courtesy and consideration toward others. Therefore, students are expected to abide by the following rules, and drive safely and defensively when approaching and exiting the school.

- All students interested in possessing a parking permit at MCHS must be in good standing (not on social probation and GPA of 1.5 or above).
- · All vehicles must be registered annually with the

school and display a parking permit.

- Parking permits may be purchased from the Treasurer's Office. The \$20 fee is non-refundable.
- Parking is strictly limited to each student's designated parking spot.
- The school is not responsible for a vehicle or its contents.
- Students are not to go to their vehicles or to the parking lot at any time during the day without permission from an administrator. Students are asked to exit their vehicles once they arrive and not remain sitting in them.
- Speeding or any form of reckless driving to or from school or on school grounds is prohibited. Drive slowly!
- Student vehicles may be subject to search if there are reasonable grounds to believe that drugs, alcohol, stolen property, or other contraband might be present in that vehicle.
- All cars should be kept locked during school hours.
- Students parked illegally will be subject to disciplinary action and the car may be towed.
- Non-handicapped students are never to park in designated handicapped areas.

Please note: By bringing a vehicle onto school property, it is implied that the student consents to a search of the vehicle and its

contents by a school administrator with a reasonable suspicion that the search will produce evidence of a violation of law, a school rule, or a condition that endangers the safety or health of the student driver or others. The student shall have no expectation of privacy in any vehicle or in the contents of any vehicle operated or parked on school property.

Students who do not abide by MCHS automobile regulations face possible sanctions under the Code of Responsible Behavior, as well as the following: warning ticket, ticket with fine, suspension of driving privileges, and towing of the vehicle.
