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Cadets of the Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) have demonstrated their commitment to MCHS by striving for excellence in extracurricular activities outside of the MCJROTC. Cadets Matthew Wilson, Jonathan Ruiz and Rayden Melendez run on the Cross Country team. Cadets Alexandra Reed, Daniel Kohn and Jayden Sledd play in the MCHS Band. Cadets Tristan Sherwood and Davian Sanchez are starters on the Wolves Football team. Sherwood is also the Cadet Commanding Officer and is applying for the ROTC scholarship, worth a maximum of \$180,000.

Despite the demands of the MCJROTC and their additional extracurriculars, all of these cadets donate time to support MCHS and the community by performing many hours of community service. Additionally, Cadets Wilson, Ruiz, Reed and Kohn are on the military drill team. This means that they are at the school by 5:45 am daily for drill team practice, go through their academic day (all are in college preparatory classes), then go to their respective athletic or band practices. They have little time to relax at home, as they must complete homework assignments and prepare for the next day's lessons.

Major Tom McGrath, the Senior Marine Instructor, noted the cadets time management skills.

"These high school students really pack much into a day. They are determined to be the best cadet and student-athlete or student- bandsman they can be. They really represent our school well."

The Marine Instructor, Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, also commented on the cadets dedication to the Michigan City Community. "Despite their time commitments to extracurriculars and their studies, they still find time to support community agencies like the Salvation Army local Food Pantries."

The cadets will be participating in a number of school and community events in October. These include the MCHS Homecoming Parade and Game on October 7th, the Walk for Alztimers on October 8th, and the middle school dance at Barker Middle School on October 14th.

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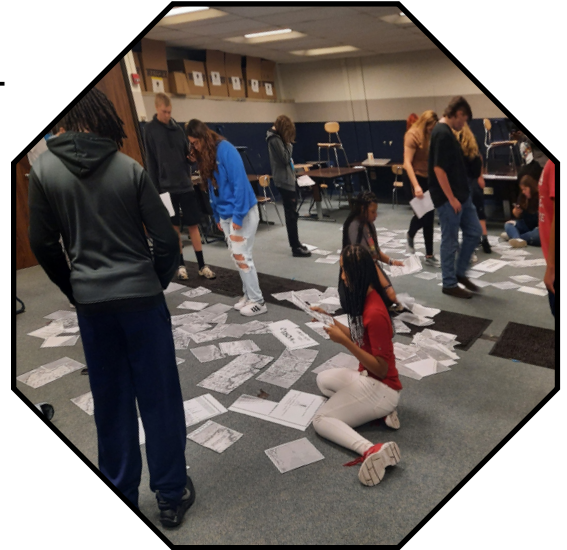

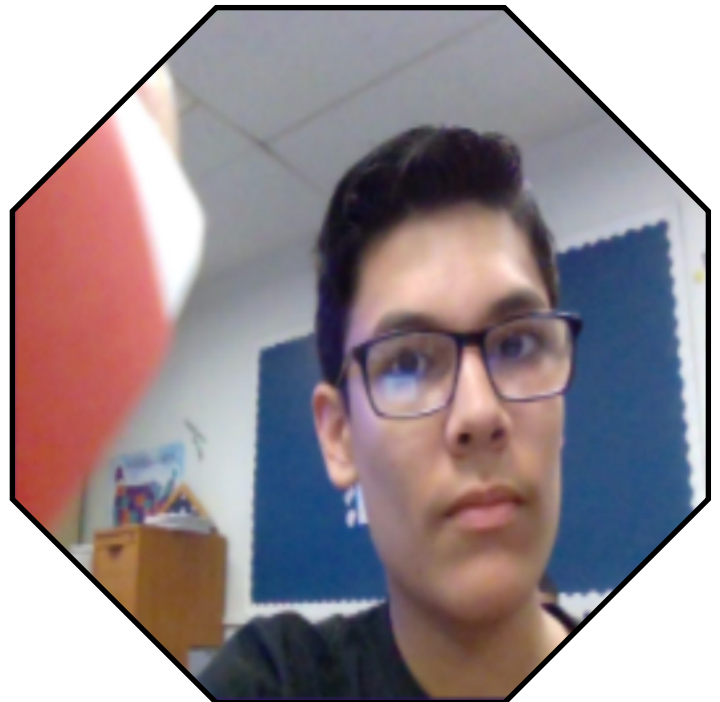

- The FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) opens on October 1st. FAFSA is a graduation requirement. FAFSA application is located on studentaid.ed.gov. We will also be holding a FAFSA night October 13th at 5:30 at MCHS to help parents and students set up an FSA ID and/or fill out the FAFSA if you need help. Please see your counselor or Mr. Garrett, College, Career, and Military Coordinator, if you have any questions.

E

- Mr. Garrett also provides useful information regarding scholarships to students via email. Please make sure you frequently check your emails so that you will not miss out.

R

- If you are applying to a college, remember to submit transcript requests on Naviance. Naviance also provides useful college information, career interest inventory, and much more.

The SAT will be held on Saturday, October 1st at MCHS. The ACT will be held on Saturday, October 22nd at MCHS. The next SAT offered at MCHS will be on Saturday, December 3rd and the next ACT will be held on Saturday, April 15th. Students can register for the SAT on collegeboard.org and ACT, act.org. SAT and ACT provide free practice tests on their website.

Students who are enrolled in an Advanced Placement (AP) course should consider signing up to take the AP exam by the end of October. Please see your AP teacher for more information.

Just a reminder, October 12th is the PSAT for freshmen, sophomores, and juniors. The ASVAB will also be October 12th for seniors who are needing to take it. Please look at your emails frequently to stay updated.

If students need help, guidance, or support, the wonderful Counselors are available to assist you with your needs. Please don't hesitate to contact your counselor.

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Groups have begun!! The Success Coaches have been diligently working to create group sessions that benefit all students. We have found that working with small groups of stu-

dents helps to reinforce core SEL and improves academic outcomes. In September, we led groups with students on school engagement, relationships, and plagiarism, all designed with student success in mind. Student groups will continue this month with a focus on behavior, academics, grades, and social emotional needs. Each day we work with students individually to help them organize and complete assignments as well as develop good study habits.

The Open Door Adolescent Health Center at MCHS is accepting registrations for the 2022-23 School Year!

The Open Door Adolescent Health Center is located at MCHS (Room O-111), and it provides comprehensive health and mental health services for students during the school day. Open Door works closely with the MCHS school nurse in providing supplemental services by a Family Nurse Practitioner, MSW Social Workers/Mental Health Counselors, and a Medical Director/Pediatrician. There is no cost to families for Open Door Adolescent Health Center services.

- Wellness and Physical/Sports Examinations
- Preventative and Health Education
- Individual and Group Mental Health Counseling

IF YOUR CHILD IS SICK PLEASE KEEP THEM HOME!

Students should stay home for 24 hours fever free with no medication to lower the fever. The same requirement applies if your student is vomiting. It is cold/sinus/allergy season, coughing and sneezing is to be expected however it is also symptoms of other illnesses. Please monitor your student closely if experiencing any of these symptoms. Also keep in mind the school nurse's office cannot diagnose or write prescriptions. Open Door has a nurse practitioner that is able to diagnose and prescribe medications. Your child must be registered with Open Door to be seen. Registration for Open Door can be done online thru MCAS website or in PowerSchool in the student registration section.

MEDICATIONS AT SCHOOL

Students may not carry medications on them at school unless it is ordered by a doctor and the documentation is on file in the nurse's office. If students are found with medication at school the medication will be confiscated and destroyed. Over the counter medications can be administered in the nurse's office when a medication authorization form is filled out by a parent/guardian and supplied in the original bottle by the parent/guardian. Prescription medications can be administered in the nurse's office with a prescription medication authorization form and provided in the prescription bottle.

Textbook Rental Fee

2022-2023 Textbook Rental Fees will be loaded soon and can be viewed in your Power-School account or the parent portal. All MCAS students will receive meals at no charge because of the Community Eligibility Program (CEP). Parents will still need to apply for the textbook assistance program in order to receive textbook assistance. This application can be completed at the time of registration and anytime during the school year. The application can be found at the Titan Family Portal, family.titank12.com.

Parents must apply for Textbook assistance EACH school year and ALL NEW STUDENTS must complete an application even if approved at the previous school.

All cafeterias are cashless and funds can be deposited to student cafeteria accounts for extra milk or la carte purchases. Please refer to the MCAS page to create your account or login.

Chromebook Insurance & Repairs

Chromebook insurance is an optional program but is highly recommended. The cost of Chromebook insurance is \$30.00 for each device and is good for ONE SCHOOL YEAR. Covers 2 accidental repairs. Equipment that is misused, abused, vandalized or repeatedly damaged through carelessness or neglect will NOT be covered by this plan and the full cost of parts and repairs will be charged to student/ parent/guardian. INSURANCE DOES NOT COVER LOST OR STOLEN DEVICES. Parent/Guardian/ Student will be responsible for the full cost of any repairs for devices that are not covered by insurance. TREASURER

Parking Permits and Expectation for Student Drivers

The use of motor vehicles for travel to and from school by students is an assumption of responsibility on the part of those students. It is a responsibility in the care of property, the observation of safety rules, and the display of courtesy and considerations toward others. Therefore, students are expected to abide by the following rules, and drive safely and defensively when approaching and exiting the school.

- All Students interested in a parking permit at MCHS must be in good standing (not on social probation and GPA of 1.5 or above).
 - All vehicles must be registered annually with the school and DISPLAY A PARKING PERMIT. Parking is strictly limited to each student's designated parking spot.
 - The school is not responsible for a vehicle or its contents.
 - Students are not to go to their vehicles or to the parking lot at any time during the day without permission from an administrator.
 - Students are asked to exit their vehicles once they arrive and not remain sitting in them.
 - Speeding or any form of reckless driving to or from school or on school grounds is prohibited.
DRIVE SLOWLY!
 - Student vehicles may be subject to search if there are reasonable grounds to believe that drugs, alcohol, stolen property, or other contraband might be present in that vehicle.
 - All cars should be kept locked during school hours.
 - Students parked illegally will be subject to disciplinary action and the car may be towed.
- Non-handicapped students are never to park in designated handicapped areas.

Please Note: By bringing a vehicle onto school property, it is implied that the student consents to a search of the vehicle and its contents by a school administrator with a reasonable suspicion that the search will produce evidence of a violation of law, a school rule, or a condition that endangers the safety or health of the student driver or others. The student shall have no expectation of privacy in any vehicle or in the contents of any vehicle operated or parked on school property.

Students who do not abide by MCHS automobile regulations face possible sanctions under the Code of Responsible Behavior, as well as the following:
