If you freshman student earned 5 or fewer credits during the first semester, please contact their guidance counselor or teachers for plans of improvement for the second semester.

Our guidance department is underway providing course and graduation information to students for the 2022-23 school year. Counselors are currently meeting with all students. Students should have their courses selected in Powerschool by February 10th. Counselors are also continuing to work with the seniors to make sure that they have all their requirements in order to graduate in June. Senior parents please remind your students how important it is to come to school and pass all of your classes in order to obtain all the credits to make sure they can graduate. Be on the lookout for a Behavior, Attendance, and Grades Report that will be sent out on February 6th. This is intended to help address any issues before the end of the 3rd quarter.

Mrs. Whitler's **Photo 2** students are working on an Iconic Photograph Report on Google Slides. Each student chose one historically significant photograph and conducted research on the photo. They had to include information about the photographer, the historical context of the photo, and why it's considered "iconic." Students will be presenting the slides to the class so students can learn about each other's chosen photo.

Photo 3 students are learning to use a manual SLR film camera. They are learning how to use the light meter for correct exposure. They also are learning how to manipulate the shutter speed and fstop settings for a specific effect. They will demonstrate their newly learned skills by taking stopped and blurred motion photos, and short and long depth of field photos.

Digital Design 1 students are learning about composition. They are creating MCHS spirit wear tshirt designs reflecting the different types of balance: symmetrical, asymmetrical, and radial. We may have a chance later in the semester to actually print their designs on a tshirt!

Digital Design 2 students are just finishing learning how to use the pen tool in Photoshop. They created a Pop Art Retro Car. Next they are learning to rasterize and warp text to create an image with text only.



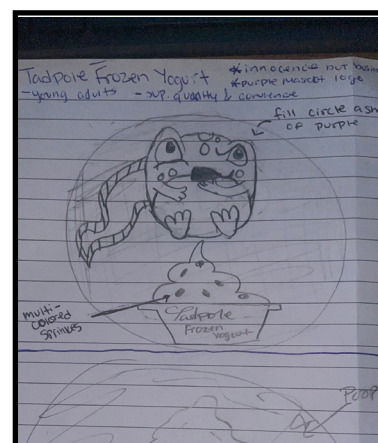
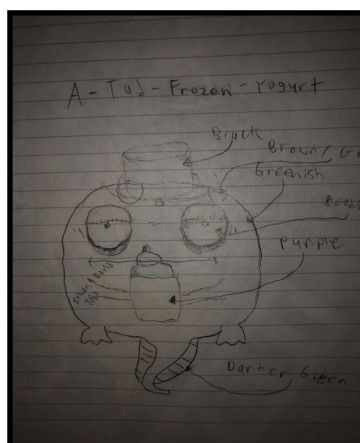
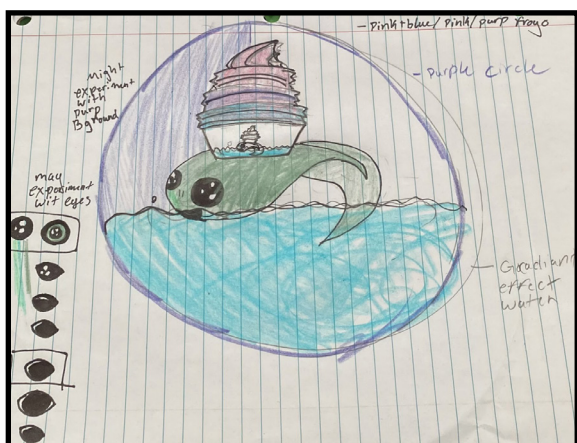
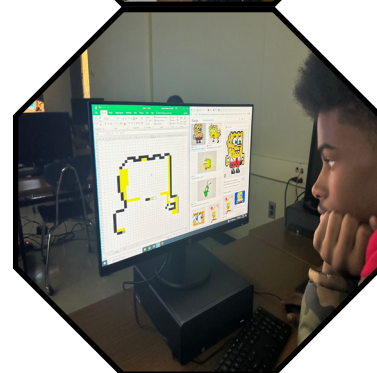
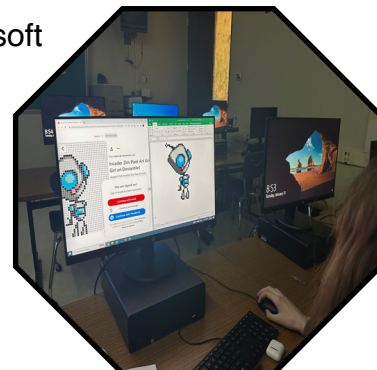

Mr. Melendez's **Digital Applications** class has been learning Microsoft Excel this grading period. Microsoft Excel is a useful program for spreadsheets but can also be utilized for digital painting and designs. Our students are working on creating a pixel art design of their favorite cartoon character. The images on the right show two students hard at work on creating their pixel art characters in Microsoft Excel.

Since Mr. Melendez's **Introduction to Computer Science** is a semester course, when we started the 2nd Semester we gained new students. We have been learning what are the components that make up a computer, cellphone, tablet etc. Students have been learning basic programming skills in the Python programming language. They recently finished Chapter 2 and when starting Chapter 3 they will be learning how to program for decision making.

Mr. Melendez's **Computer Science 1** classes have been learning about arrays. An array can be thought of as a variable that can hold multiple values of the same data type. We have started to learn about Two Dimensional Arrays (2D), these arrays can be thought of as a table that has rows and columns. When we start diving deeper into these topics it can be difficult to understand how it would be represented in the real world. We have to change the way our brain thinks about things in order to understand arrays, 2D arrays and multi-dimensional arrays.

Mr. Melendez's **Computer Illustration & Graphics** has started learning how to create vector based graphics using Adobe Illustrator. Our first project was to create a postcard for Parent Teacher Conferences. Our second project is to create a Mascot Logo for Tadpole Frozen Yogurt. The students are extremely excited about this project. Below you will find sketches of the students logo designs for the frozen yogurt company.

Looking Ahead: Third Quarter

We have a lot of exciting material that we will be covering during the third quarter. In US History DC, students will be learning about the time period from Reconstruction to the New Deal. In English 10 Honors we will be reading *Night*, by Elie Wiesel, a memoir about his experiences living through the Holocaust and Nazi Concentration Camps. Students have started researching for background knowledge already. This memoir is rich in content, language, and themes. For Geometry, we are exploring Trigonometry, the study of triangles. It is a small unit followed up by the fundamentals of solid geometry, or using math in relation to 3 dimensional solids. This quarter in Chemistry is where we get into the real “Meat and Potatoes” of Chemistry, the math portion. Students will be learning about Moles, Stoichiometry, and Percent Composition of chemicals. We will also be throwing in some Balancing Chemical Equations to keep it fun. Mr. Goebel suggests that students make sure they stay current on their assignments and utilize Skills Class as much as possible as these subjects are the most difficult parts of Chemistry Class for most students.

MCHS MCJROTC EARNS AWARDS AT PORTAGE DRILL MEET

The Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) earned 2nd place trophies in Armed Regulation and Inspection at the Portage High School Drill competition on January 14th. This meet was the precursor to the Marine Sectional Meet at Indianapolis on January 28th which will decide who can compete at the National Marine Championship in Wasington, DC in the Spring.

“Our cadets have put in the time and effort to improve, and I think they showed that at Portage,” said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath. “We still need to progress to be competitive at Ben Davis. The reality is that we are drilling against schools with field-houses and multiple gyms, so they have much more flexibility as to their practice schedules. Our kids have to come in at 5:45 am, as that is the only time we have access to our school’s one gym. Even then, we still have to make adjustments when the basketball teams come in for extra shooting practices, and now spring sports are starting.”

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, noted the cadets determination despite not finishing as high as expected. “We have freshmen and sophomores commanding units, and they are persistent in working hard at practice. With most other schools having experienced seniors commanding, our cadets are still competitive. We just need a little more experience to get us to where we want to be.”

The Ben Davis meet will be even more competitive than the Portage meet, as this is the national qualifier. Regardless of how the Wolves do in Indianapolis, they plan on competing at Concordia High School in Ft. Wayne on March 4th. This will be another tough meet, as schools from all services participate in this meet, to include schools who drill at the All-Service Championship in Florida. “We have a young team, and our cadets want to continue to improve, so that we are stronger for next year,” said McGrath.



MCHS JROTC PRESENTS TO MIDDLE SCHOOLS

One of the negative impacts of the Covid school shut-downs has been elective courses enrollment reduction. With students falling behind during remote learning, many are now in intervention programs, thus unable to fit an elective course in their schedule. The JROTC programs of all services nationwide have been battling to increase enrollment. The Department of Defense mandates

that schools have at least 100 students to maintain the program. The Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) provided an informational presentation to 8th graders at Barker and Kreuger Middle Schools to inform them of the benefits of participating in this course. The program began with an introduction by Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath, emphasizing that the MCJROTC is a leadership program, not a preparation for the military program. There were demonstrations of regulation and exhibition military drill, physical training events, reflections by a female and male cadet, and then a question and answer period.

“The Marine Corps knows that we have a very active, well-rounded program, so I do not think Michigan City is in danger of losing it,” said McGrath “In addition to increasing enrollment, we do these presentations to ensure that students have the correct information about the MCJROTC.”

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, commented on the reaction of the students. “These 8th graders at both schools were attentive and responded very favorably to the presentation of our cadets. I am optimistic that we will obtain a good return on the investment of time and energy that our cadets have put forth in practice and demonstrated today.”

The MCHS military drill team will compete at Portage on January 14th and at Indianapolis Ben Davis on January 28th, with the objective of qualifying for the Marine Corps championship in Washington, DC, in the Spring. If they qualify, that trip, like all MCJROTC activities, is done at no cost to the student or MCHS. Costs are completely covered by the Marine Corps. Cadets will also be supporting various MCHS events, to include all home basketball games and gymnastics meets.



MCHS MCJROTC HAS NO TIME FOR THE WINTER BLUES

After the exhilaration of the holidays, January has been known as the winter blues month. Psychologists say that one of the best remedies for depression is to immerse yourself into a meaningful activity. The cadets of the Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) have done just that by supporting MCHS and by competing in two military drill competitions in January.

Cadets have assisted the MCHS Gymnastics team in the setting-up and disestablishment of the equipment required for their home meets. Cadets have also provided the Color Guards for the home boys basketball game. One moving moment at one of those games was a special presentation

The MCHS Drill team had meets at Portage on January 14 and Indianapolis Ben Davis on July 28th. “Our cadets showed considerable improvement from the Portage meet to the Ben Davis competition,” said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath. “Although not qualifying for the Marine Corps National Championship, our cadets have really shown the drive it takes to make it there. With almost the entire team returning next year, I am very optimistic that we will be very competitive to land a slot at that championship meet.”

The Drill Team has one more meet at Ft. Wayne Concordia High School on March 4th. Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, views this meet as both a send off to the team’s seniors and the kick-off for next year. “Our cadets have demonstrated the desire to improve, to do whatever it takes to make it to the next level. At Concordia, we want to give our Seniors one last good meet and set the tone to make it to DC for the championship meet next year.”

The Back on Track after-school Program continues!! This program is designed to help students work on recovering credits they are currently deficient in that are required for graduation. Besides credit recovery, tutoring is also available. Back on Track runs on Tuesdays, and Thursdays from 2:30 – 4:15. Transportation home is available for students. Contact your student's counselor if you are interested in this program.

Career and technical education is a great way for students to begin earning credits and certifications for their chosen careers along with completing graduation pathway requirements. Students who are interested in applying for a career pathway at the LaPorte Career and Technical Education Center, (AK Smith), should complete the 2 part application process as soon as possible. First, students must complete the online enrollment form for the LaPorte County Career and Technical Education Center, <https://www.mcas.k12.in.us/Domain/21>. Second, students must complete the LaPorte CTE confirmation form (available from the Guidance Office), complete the top portion including signatures from the student, and parent, or guardian, then return the form to their counselor.

Seniors need to make sure that they have completed their FAFSA, whether they are planning to go to college, the military, or into a career training program. Completing the FAFSA is a graduation requirement. Many opportunities for funding, including scholarships, grants, and student loans require that you have completed a FAFSA on file. The earlier you complete this, the better your outcome for receiving funding for your goals. Although the deadline to complete the FAFSA is April 15th, it is **HIGHLY RECOMMENDED TO COMPLETE YOUR FAFSA WAY AHEAD OF THIS DATE**. Many colleges have deadlines in February and March. Some schools award financial aid on a first-come-first-served basis. Get your FAFSA completed early. This cannot be stressed enough! Please direct any FAFSA questions to Mr. Aaron Garrett, agarrett@mcas.k12.in.us.

ASVAB testing for the spring semester will be on February 22nd. All Juniors (and Seniors who still need Bucket 3 on the Indiana Graduation Pathway) will be taking the ASVAB on this date. On Thursday, March 2nd all Juniors will be taking the SAT. WolfPack RoundUp will be held during Friday Night Live on February 24th from 6:00-6:30.



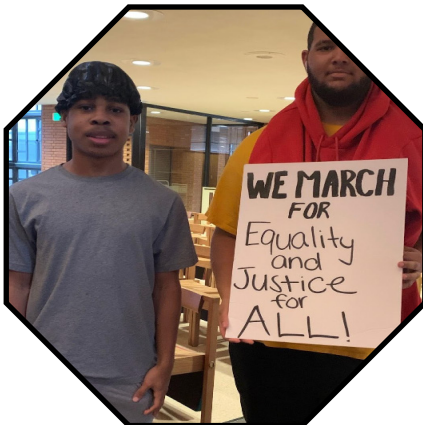

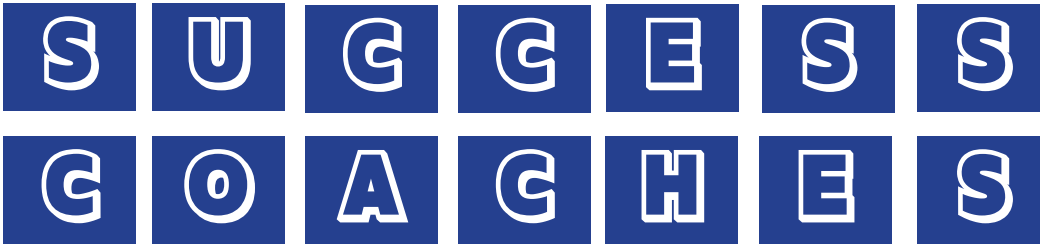
It's 2023!!
