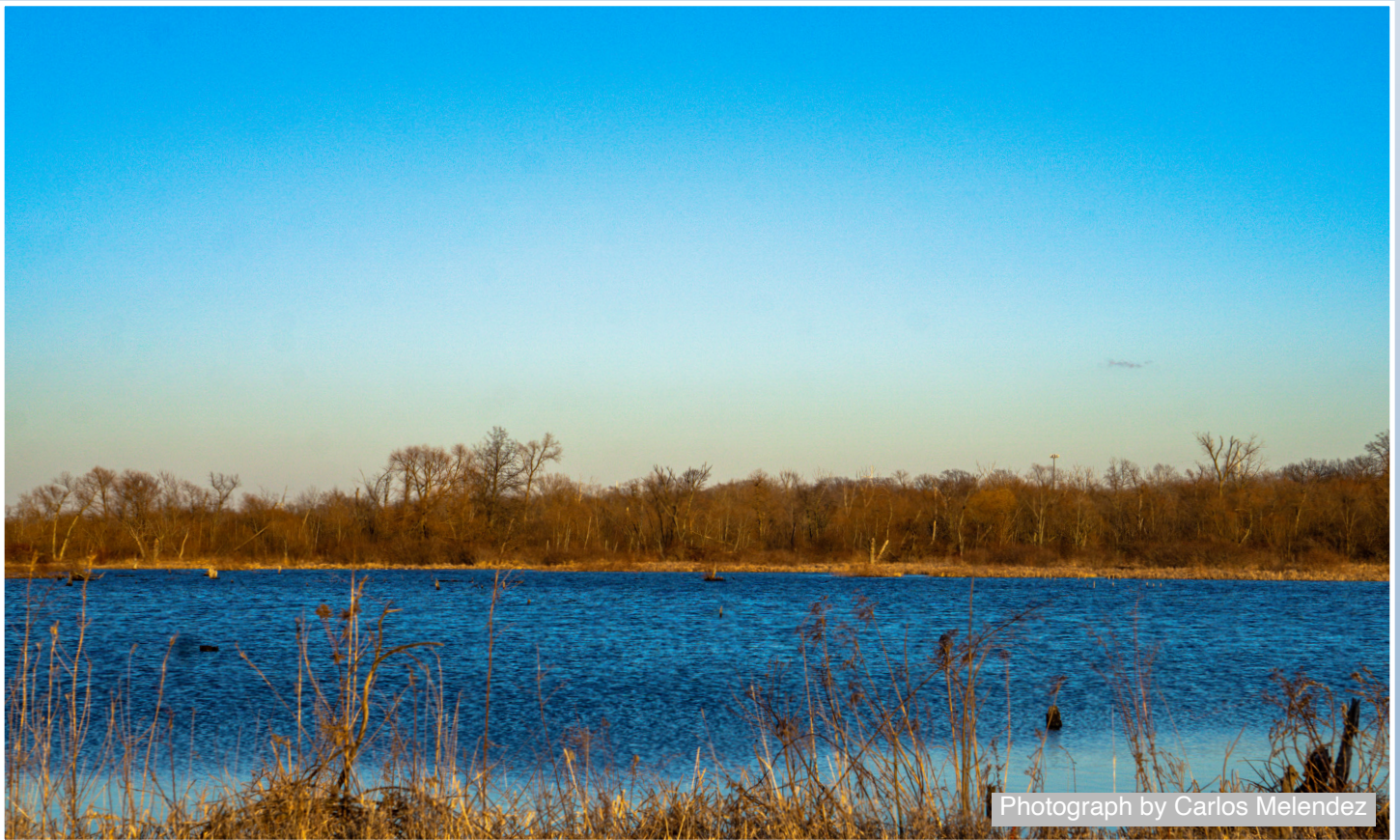

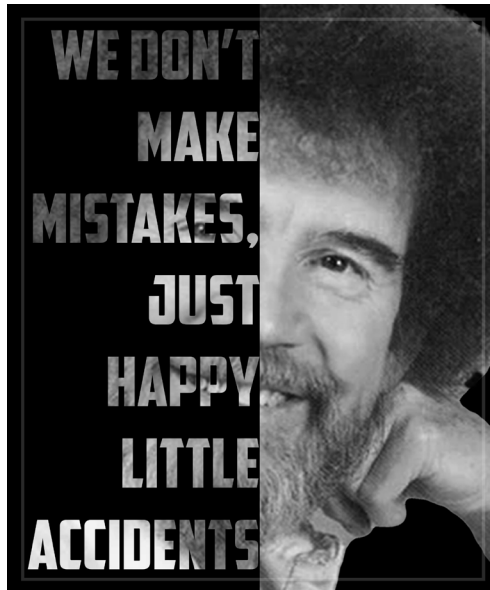
Mrs. Whitler's **Digital Design I** students are beginning their first project on Photoshop. They are studying typography and creating a face using only letters or numbers. The faces are whimsical and creative!

**Digital Design II** students are working on a portrait of a famous person with a quote superimposed on the face and the letters cut out so the face can be seen through the letters.

**Photography II** students are printing photos in the darkroom from their first roll of film this semester. More experience in the darkroom helps students improve their printing skills. They will also be starting to learn historical and alternative processes, such as cyanotypes, sepia toning, and Van Dykes. These processes are historic ways to create photographs that were popular before commercially-made, pre-coated photo paper was available. Here's an example of a cyanotype photogram we will be making in class:

Mr. Melendez's **Digital Applications** class has started a research project that will encompass all they have learned using Microsoft Word, Excel and PowerPoint. The students are researching the positive and negative effects that social media has on teenagers. They are researching social media usage in the 90s, 2000s, 2010s and current.

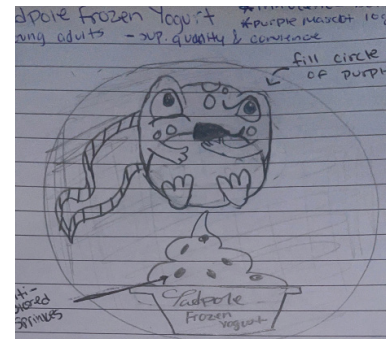
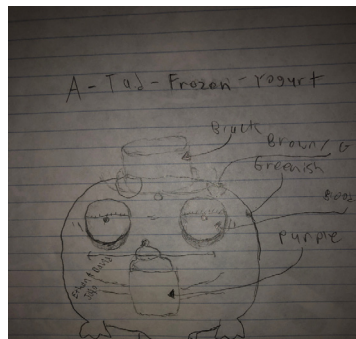
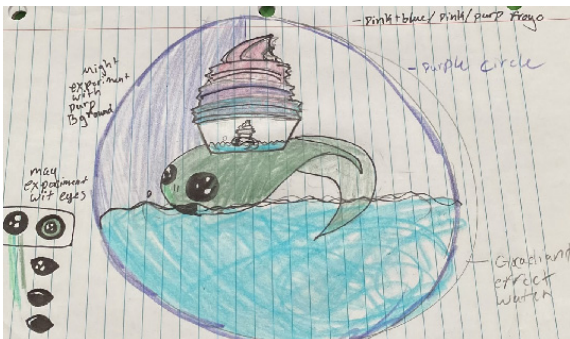
Mr. Melendez's **Introduction to Computer Science** class has been learning about making decisions with If, Elif and Else statements, these are known as decision structures. Students have also been learning about relational and logical operators and how to use them in decision structures as well as in repetition structures (loops). Last week we started learning about loops and why they are important in programming.

Mr. Melendez's **Computer Science 1** classes started learning about inheritance. Inheritance is when one class inherits attributes from another class and is able to have their own attributes. The way the students were introduced to this idea is by thinking of parent and child. The child will gain attributes from their parents but at the same time having their own attributes.

In programming the "parent class" is known as a superclass and the "child class" is known as the subclass. An example would be: public class FinalExam extends GradedActivity

## MCHS MCJROTC support MCAS, Prepares for busy semester end

The Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) continued to support Michigan City Area Schools activities by providing Color Guards for the MCHS and Kreuger Middle School basketball teams, as well as guides for school tours for the Wolfpack Round-up.. The MCHS Military Drill Team continued its daily 5:45 am practices, preparing for their last competition at Concordia High School in Ft. Wayne. The cadets will also be working the Regional and Semi-State basketball tournaments on March 11 and 18th, marching in the Michigan City St. Patrick's Day parade on March 11, and supporting the Boys and Girls Track Teams for all home meets.

In addition to the many community service events, MCHS is coordinating the JROTC Leadership Camp in June at St. John's Military Academy in Wisconsin. In addition to MCHS cadets, JROTC units from Portage, Indianapolis Ben Davis, and Romeoville, IL will also attend. This camp offers a great opportunity for cadets to develop their leadership skills in a field environment. It costs approximately \$400.00 per cadet to run this camp. Each school will be bringing 20 cadets. All costs are funded by the Marine Corps. No costs are incurred by the cadet or school.

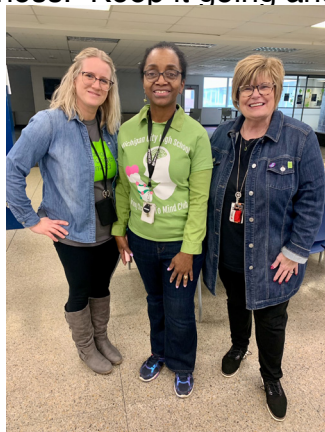
## Emotion of the Month - Confident

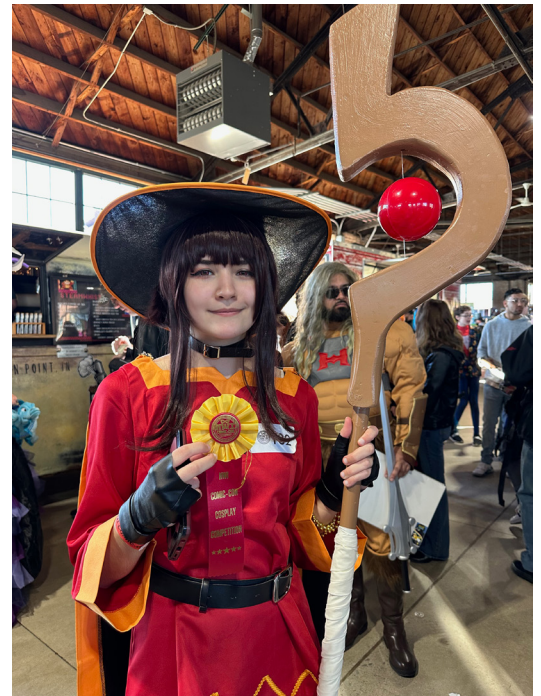

Ryan Neal, a standout player for the Seattle Seahawks visited Michigan City High School Thursday February 23 and spent quality time speaking with the football and basketball teams along with a couple PE classes. Neal, who is a graduate of Merrillville High School, was in town following a ceremony at his alma mater where his jersey was retired. Neal reached out to Michigan City High School and offered to speak and was welcomed with open arms.

A rising star in the NFL, Neal graduated from Southern Illinois. He spoke frankly with the Wolves athletes about the efforts that he took and the struggles to achieve a spot in “the league”. Neal comes from an athletic background and gives a tremendous amount of credit to his older brother Mike who played linebacker for Green Bay and was a member of the Packer team that won Super Bowl XLV.

Neal’s strongest message to the student athletes was to “be where your feet are” explaining that distractions like social media are career stoppers and while they may fill an immediate need, it’ll never take the place of living and working hard in the real world. He encouraged everyone to always “take care of business before fun”, never neglect your education and again stressed “don’t get wrapped up on social media because it’s fake”.

In response to a student’s question about the daily life of an NFL player, Neal was quick to dismiss the notion that it is all party and glamor. He explained that during the off-season he works out from 5:00 AM until 3:00 PM at least four days a week and during the 17-week NFL season his day starts at 5:00 AM and often won’t end until 11:00 PM.

Neal encouraged the athletes to focus and be relentless in pursuit of their goals and shared several stories of his difficult climb to the pros including living in a rather seedy motel for a year. He said that he was on a mission to bring the stellar athletes from the DAC to the league because he knows first hand the depth of talent that lies “in the 219”. One of the most poignant messages that Neal delivered before he stood with the students for a group photo was this... “I am you”. A short but deeply meaningful message that hopefully the students took to heart.

## **TEXTBOOK RENTAL FEES**

The 2022/2023 Textbook Rental Fee Statements have been sent home via mail and email, if we have a current email on file for the guardian. The statements are for the school year, not by semester. You may make payments throughout the year with check, cash, or money orders. On-line payments are not available this year. We would like all fees to be paid by the end of the school year. Contact the treasurer if you have any questions. **IMPORTANT INFORMATION CONCERNING TEXTBOOK RENTAL ASSISTANCE!** All students at Michigan City Area Schools will receive meals at no charge because of the Community Eligibility Program (CEP)! Students still need funds in their cafeteria account for extra milk or a la carte purchases (all cafeterias are cashless). If you need more information visit the food service website at [educatemc.net/food](http://educatemc.net/food). Because of this program, parents no longer need to apply for meal assistance. However, parents **MUST** still apply for Textbook Rental Assistance. The Textbook Assistance and Other Educational Benefits application is part of the online registration for all students. If you did not complete the form for this when registering your child, you can complete an application at the Titan Family Portal at [family.titank12.com](http://family.titank12.com). Parents must apply for assistance **EACH** school year. Because situations change, families may apply at any time during the year. If you receive Food Stamps or TANF you may already be pre-approved for assistance. New students to Michigan City Area Schools must complete an application even if they were approved in their old school corporation.

## **SENIOR PARENTS-IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR PAST DUE FEES**

Please watch for information for past due Textbook Rental and Chromebook fees. If you have past due fees you will receive a report of fees due in the mail soon.

## **CHROMEBOOK INSURANCE AND OTHER CHARGES**

We are again offering an optional insurance program for Chromebooks. We highly recommend that all families purchase this insurance as soon as possible! The insurance plan is \$30 for each device and is good for **ONE** year. It will cover two (2) accidental repairs that require part replacement throughout the school year. Equipment that is misused, abused, vandalized or repeatedly damaged through carelessness or neglect will **NOT** be covered by this plan and the full cost of parts will be charged to the student/parent/ guardian. Please note: Insurance does not cover lost or stolen equipment. If you decline to purchase the insurance, your family is responsible for all costs involved with the repair or replacement of the device. When a repair or service is performed and the device is not insured, you will be invoiced. If the invoice is not paid by due date, you will be turned over to a collection agency and a \$30 fee plus court costs will be added to your balance. The replacement/repair costs of the Chromebooks/ Tablets are as follows: • Entire Chromebook/Tablet - \$180 • LCD screen repair/replacement - \$80 • Keyboard repair - \$45 If you have any questions regarding this program, please contact the MCAS Technology department at 219-873-2000 ext 8327.

## **PARKING PERMIT INFORMATION**

Many students have completed their application but have not paid the fee and obtained their parking permit. Please see the treasurer **ASAP** to complete the process. Students need to complete the application using the link below and upload their driver's license and registration. After submitting the application they can pay for the permit at the treasurer's office. They will receive a receipt and their permit for their designated parking spot. Permit Application The use of motor vehicles for travel to and from school by students is an assumption of responsibility on the part of those students. It is

a responsibility in the care of property, the observation of safety rules, and the display of courtesy and consideration toward others. Therefore, students are expected to abide by the following rules, and drive safely and defensively when approaching and exiting the school. • All students interested in possessing a parking permit at MCHS must be in good standing (not on social probation and GPA of 1.5 or above). • All vehicles must be registered annually with the school and display a parking permit. • Parking permits may be purchased from the Treasurer's Office. The \$20 fee is non-refundable. • Parking is strictly limited to each student's designated parking spot.

The school is not responsible for a vehicle or its contents. • Students are not to go to their vehicles or to the parking lot at any time during the day without permission from an administrator. Students are asked to exit their vehicles once they arrive and not remain sitting in them. • Speeding or any form of reckless driving to or from school or on school grounds is prohibited. Drive slowly! • Student vehicles may be subject to search if there are reasonable grounds to believe that drugs, alcohol, stolen property, or other contraband might be present in that vehicle. • All cars should be kept locked during school hours. • Students parked illegally will be subject to disciplinary action and the car may be towed. • Non-handicapped students are never to park in designated handicapped areas. Please note: By bringing a vehicle onto school property, it is implied that the student consents to a search of the vehicle and its contents by a school administrator with a reasonable suspicion that the search will produce evidence of a violation of law, a school rule, or a condition that endangers the safety or health of the student driver or others. The student shall have no expectation of privacy in any vehicle or in the contents of any vehicle operated or parked on school property. Students who do not abide by MCHS automobile regulations face possible sanctions under the Code of Responsible Behavior, as well as the following: warning ticket, ticket with fine, suspension of driving privileges, and towing of the vehicle.
