



Computer Science 2: Cybersecurity

In our Cybersecurity class, students have been diving into the world of online safety. We have been emphasizing the importance of being cautious and vigilant when browsing the internet. Over the past few weeks, our focus has been on Phishing Emails and how to recognize if they have come from a legitimate source. Students have been learning about various techniques such as Cookie Manipulation, Command Injection, SQL Injection, Key Exchange, and Steganography.

Their final project culminated in understanding what to do when receiving a phishing email and how to determine if a file

was embedded in an attached document. We believe these skills are crucial in today's digital age, and we encourage you to have conversations at home about online safety and the importance of being attentive to potential cyber threats.

Principles of Digital Design

In Principles of Digital Design, our students have been hard at work on their final projects. They have been following Bob Ross tutorials on YouTube, which have allowed them to learn valuable skills in digital painting. Through this project, students have been exploring the use of the mixer brush tool and simulating painting techniques.

Principles of Computing

These past 3 weeks in Principles of Computing, our students have been hard at work on their final project. The culmination of their semester-long journey, the final project involved creating a text-based game. Students wrote their own captivating stories and then coded them using Python. These text adventures were designed to provide an interactive and immersive experience for the players.

Computer Illustration and Graphics

We are thrilled to announce that our students in the Computer Illustration and Graphics class have completed their final project! This project involved redesigning the Trail Creek signs for the Town of Trail Creek, in celebration of their 100-year anniversary in 2024. MCHS MCJROTC EARNS AWARDS AT MILITARY DRILL COMPETITION

The Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) earned awards at the Portage High School military drill meet on Saturday, December 2nd. The Wolves earned a 2nd place in the Personnel Inspection and 3rd places in Color Guard (Armed Division) and Armed Regulation. Cadet First Lieutenant Marcus Mantel, who commanded those three units plus the Armed Exhibition Platoon, earned special recognition from the Commanding Officer of the Purdue University Navy ROTC. Captain Chris Nelson, an active duty Navy officer, noted Mantel's exceptional individual performance in leading MCHS. Purdue NROTC midshipmen judged the event.

"Our cadets performed well against stiff competition," said Major Tom McGrath, the Senior Marine Instructor. "Now we know what we need to focus on to be prepared for the sectional meet." The Sectional meet will be held at Ben Davis High School in Indianapolis on January 27th. The winner of that meet will compete in the National Championship meet in the Washington, DC area in April.

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, agreed with McGrath, and is optimistic that the cadets can improve on their Portage performance and be competitive in the sectional meet. "We have some inexperienced cadets who have made great strides this year. We just have to continue to work hard during this month and next month."

In addition to the Drill Team, the MCHS cadets will be competing in CyberPatriot, the national cyber security game for high school students. They will also be supporting MCHS and the community, by helping with the One City One Sound holiday concert, the Salvation Army' drive to help the underprivileged, and leading the Michigan City Festival of Lights parade.

CYBERPATRIOT

Cybersecurity is one of the fastest growing occupational fields, a career that pays well and has high job satisfaction. The cadets of the MIchigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) are obtaining a head start on the requirements of being a security manager of an information systems network by participating in Cyber Patriot, the national high school cybersecurity competition. They competed on December 7th, defending against a mock cyber attack. Besides the technical skills of manipulating the virtual imagery, cadets are also exercising decisiveness and judgment regarding making choices in a stressful situation. This was the state qualifying round. Results will be released next week.

"CyberPatriot provides great experience for a growing career field," said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath. "We are very fortunate here at MCHS to have Mr. Ralph Gee, the Engineering and Robotics Instructor, to advise us on the best way to prepare for the competition."

Gee was impressed with the improvement made by the cadets this year. "It is great that all three will return, as they have established a solid foundation for us to compete at the next level." MCHS's goal is to make it to the National Finals which are held in the Washington, DC area every Spring.

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, cited the effort demonstrated by the cadets on the team. "These cadets really show our "whole cadet" concept. We run a well-rounded program, exposing cadets to all JROTC extracurriculars." In addition to Cyber-Patriot, MCHS has Military Drill, Shooting and Raider teams.

Besides the CyberPatriot competition, the cadets also participated in the Portage High School JROTC Military Drill Meet, provided Color Guards for the LaPorte County Veterans Court graduation and the MCHS Boys home basketball games, and supported the Salvation Army and the Michigan City Area Schools One City One Sound holiday concert.

MCJROTC SUPPORTS MCAS, COMMUNITY

The Michigan City High School (MCHS) Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (MCJROTC) participated in many civic events in support of Michigan City Area Schools (MCAS) and the LaPorte County community. Among those activities were supporting the Salvation Army with food donations, helping the Deserving Children's Shopping Tour, and assisting with the set-up and clean-up of the One City One Sound MCAS Holiday Concert. Cadets also led the Michigan City Festival of Lights Parade, along with providing Color Guards for the LaPorte County Veterans Court graduation and the MCHS home boys basketball games.

"Our cadets are exceptionally unselfish with their time and talents," said Senior Marine Instructor Major Tom McGrath. "Many of these cadets are on our drill team, which means their day starts at 0545 (5:45 am), and then they are doing community service at night and on the weekends."

Master Sergeant Jeff Benak, the Marine Instructor, also noted that the cadets have their priorities straight. "These cadets know that, despite all of the time they put into our extracurriculars and community service, academics is still the priority. Many of them have 3.0 cums (B average) or higher, and a few are straight A students."

The JROTC will continue to support the community, with the MCAS food drive on December 16th and the Salvation Army food distribution on December 21st. The MCHS military drill team will be practicing over the Christmas break in preparation for the Sectional Championship meet at Indianapolis Ben Davis High School on January 27th. If the Wolves win that meet, they will travel to the Washington, DC area to compete in the National Championship in April. The cadets will continue to support MCHS athletics, providing Color Guards for the basketball games and set-up help for the gymnastic meets. They will also do presentations at Barker and Krueger Middle Schools to familiarize 8th Graders with the

JROTC prior to the 8th graders scheduling for their courses for their fresh-

men year.


